

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# 1. Introduction and purpose

- 1.1 This is one of nine topic papers produced to inform the Draft Plan consultation on the Greater Cambridge Local Plan. The topic papers are:
  - Strategy
  - Sites
  - Climate change
  - Green infrastructure
  - · Wellbeing and social
  - Great places
  - Jobs
  - Homes
  - Infrastructure
- 1.2 All of the papers can be found on the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning website. The topic papers set out how each policy under the relevant Local Plan 'Theme' has been developed. As such, the topic papers support and complement the Draft Plan consultation document as they provide a detailed explanation of the basis for each draft policy.
- 1.3 The topic papers build on those published as part of the First Proposals Consultation. They provide background on the early development of the policies. These are still available to view in our document library.
- 1.4 The policies are presented in a consistent format in each paper with sufficient information to provide a comprehensive appreciation of the background to and development of the Policy.

# 2. Biodiversity and green spaces chapter

## Introduction

- 2.1 As part of the First Conversation consultation in 2020 we set out our approach to ensuring that the restoration of habitat networks and the provision of more and enhanced green spaces would be at the heart of the new Local Plan.
- 2.2 The First Proposals consultation in 2021 identified how biodiversity and green spaces had influenced the emerging strategy, and proposed a series of development management policies which would ensure development is informed by and incorporates our green infrastructure initiatives.
- 2.3A number of comments were received on the general approach to the theme.
  Further detail, including where to view the full representations and who made each representation, is provided in the Consultation Statement.

# Summary of the main issues raised in general comments on the biodiversity and green infrastructure theme

2.4 The majority of comments provide broad support for the objectives and priorities for improved biodiversity was expressed within the representations from a range of individuals, organisations and developers, with comments that policies must be as strong as can be to protect and enhance existing green spaces and networks. Comments included that the area has good green spaces which add to the rural character, are a huge asset and should be protected from development, but that there is pressure on green spaces, often conflict between recreational use of green spaces and biodiversity, and that sufficient land should be provided for both. It was suggested the Objectives should include the 'Doubling Nature' ambition. A small number of comments raised concern about the environmental capacity of the area, suggesting that the aims of this theme would be challenging to deliver, and suggesting that the development strategy did not accord with those aims.

# Response to the main issues raised in representations

- 2.5 Respondents raised a number of important matters through previous consultations on the emerging Local Plan. These matters have been considered during the preparation of the plan and its policies.
- 2.6 The Councils' response to these matters include:
  - Comments supporting the broad approach to the theme are noted.
  - The plan seeks to address the needs of places for wildlife, and places for people, and reflecting the importance of requiring appropriate quantity and quality of green infrastructure.
- 2.7 More detailed commentary relating to the ways in which the policies in this theme have been amended in response to comments provided through previous consultations are set out below.

# Biodiversity and green spaces policies

2.8 The following proposed policies areas are addressed in this topic paper:

BG/BG: Biodiversity and geodiversity

• BG/GI: Green infrastructure

• BG/TC: Improving tree canopy cover and the tree population

• BG/RC: River corridors

• BG/PO: Protecting open spaces

• BG/EO: Providing and enhancing open spaces.



# 3. Policy BG/BG: Biodiversity and geodiversity

#### Issue the plan is seeking to respond to

3.1 The Plan is seeking to protect and enhance biodiversity and geodiversity, noting the strong current international, national, regional and local priorities supporting this.

#### How the issue was covered in the First Proposals consultation

# Policy context update

- 3.4 There have been changes to the national or local policy context from that which informed the First Proposals, these being:
- 3.5 The relevant primary legislation for the statutory framework for biodiversity net gain is principally set out under Schedule 7A (Biodiversity Gain in England) of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 ("the 1990 Act"). This legislation was inserted into the 1990 Act by Schedule 14 of the Environment Act 2021 and was amended by the Levelling Up and Regeneration Act 2023. Under the 2021 Environment Act all planning permissions granted in England (with a few exemptions) except for small sites have to deliver at least 10% biodiversity net gain development (unless exempt). A key component of the Environment Act 2021 introduced a requirement for local areas to produce mandatory spatial strategies for nature: Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS), aiming to set priorities for nature recovery across England. These spatial strategies are being developed by 'Responsible Authorities' (RA) as set out by DEFRA; the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) is the RA for the

county. The CPCA has contracted the responsibility to Cambridgeshire County
Council to develop the LNRS in collaboration with Natural Cambridgeshire (Local
Nature Partnership) as a key partner.

- 3.6 Regulations implementing biodiversity net gain came into force on 12 February 2024, with small sites becoming liable from 2 April 2024. Those which are most directly relevant to BNG are:
  - The Environment Act 2021 (Commencement No. 8 and Transitional Provisions) Regulations 2024 which commence biodiversity net gain for most types of new planning applications and provides transitional arrangements for section 73 planning applications to vary the conditions of planning permissions.
  - The Biodiversity Gain Requirements (Exemptions) Regulations 2024
    which prescribe exemptions for categories of development to which
    biodiversity net gain does not apply, most notably householder
    applications.
  - The Biodiversity Gain (Town and Country Planning) (Modifications and Amendments) (England) Regulations 2024 which amend the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015 and the Town and Country Planning (Section 62A Applications) (Procedure and Consequential Amendments) Order 2013 to include provisions in respect of applications for planning permission and the submission and determination of Biodiversity Gain Plans, as well as modifications of Schedule 7A of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 for phased development. The Biodiversity Gain Hierarchy is set out in Articles 4 37A and 37D of the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015.
  - The Biodiversity Gain Requirements (Irreplaceable Habitat) Regulations
     2024 which set out the modifications for irreplaceable habitat. In Greater
     Cambridge such habitat includes ancient woodland, ancient trees, veteran trees and lowland fens.

- 3.7New National Planning Practice Guidance on biodiversity net gain was introduced in February 2024 and subsequently updated in May 2024. The guidance sets out that plan-makers may seek a higher percentage than the statutory objective of 10% BNG either on an areawide basis or for specific allocations for development where this is supported by local evidence, including:
  - local need for a higher percentage; and
  - local opportunities; and
  - impacts on viability for development.
- 3.8 The guidance also sets out that plan-makers can complement the statutory framework for BNG by, for instance, including policies that support appropriate local off-site biodiversity sites, including whether specific allocated sites for development should include biodiversity enhancements to support other developments meet their net gain objectives in line with Local Nature Recovery Strategies.
- 3.9 The guidance also sets out that the Biodiversity Gain Hierarchy prioritises the delivery of BNG as follows:
  - first, in relation to onsite habitats which have a medium, high and very high
    distinctiveness (a score of four or more according to the statutory
    biodiversity metric), the avoidance of adverse effects from the
    development and, if they cannot be avoided, the mitigation of those
    effects; and
  - then, in relation to all on-site habitats which are adversely affected by the
    development, the adverse effect should be compensated by prioritising in
    order, where possible, the enhancement of existing onsite habitats,
    creation of new on-site habitats, allocation of registered offsite gains and
    finally the purchase of biodiversity credits.
- 3.10 Planning authorities must take into account how the Biodiversity Gain Hierarchy has been applied and if it has not been applied the reason for that or absence of a reason when determining whether to approve the Biodiversity Gain Plan.

# Natural Environment National Planning Practice Guidance (most recently updated in June 2025)

3.11 The government has recently updated the planning practice guidance (PPG) on protecting and enhancing the natural environment. Paragraphs 009 and 018-021 are updated to reflect the commencement of biodiversity net gain, publication of separate guidance on this, and to reflect the introduction of a biodiversity duty: a new paragraph 'How can developments incorporate features which support priority or threatened species?'. The PPG guidance was also updated to provide additional guidance on how LNRS will interact with the planning system paragraphs 044 to 047 was updated, and updates to paragraphs 009, 010 and 011: this updated guidance states that local planning authorities must have regard to Local Nature Recovery Strategies, as these are prepared, because they will establish local priorities for biodiversity and other environmental benefits and identify locations where biodiversity enhancement would be particularly beneficial.

# Summary of issues arising from First Proposals representations

- 3.12 Broad support for the policy principles was expressed within the representations from a range of individuals, organisations and developers, with comments including that preserving and enhancing biodiversity was important for health and wellbeing, carbon sequestration, place making, and benefits the economy. Comments suggested that the policy and objectives should be strengthened to guide development away from sensitive areas and refuse development that has adverse effects, and that buffer zones are needed to protect wildlife beyond sites and create green corridors. Comments noted that the policy only relates to controlling the impact of developments not improving existing sites (which was considered a missed opportunity).
- 3.13 Many comments, particularly from related organisations, supported the proposal for 20% biodiversity net gain. Concerns were raised by some developers that the minimum 20% Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) target was double

the Environment Bill's proposed level of 10%, that it was not justified, too onerous and not achievable in all cases, and that there needs to be further consideration of viability and deliverability and flexibility to avoid stifling development. Some comments considered that the BNG approach can fail to deliver benefits if new ecosystems are substituted, and green networks interrupted. Comments were received from developers promoting sites with the opportunity to deliver BNG. Other comments suggested that the 20% was not high enough, and a higher requirement should be included if doubling nature was to be achieved.

- 3.14 Concerns were raised by some individuals and community groups about how BNG will be calculated. Comments suggested a need for professionally accredited independent reports, and that the assessment should consider all important species, local and special characteristics, and adjoining nature sites.
- 3.15 Comments were expressed about off-site provision of biodiversity, that the creation of larger networks will be beneficial to wildlife and support ecological resilience, that clear delivery mechanisms were required which could include purchasing credits, the need to ensure developers deliver before occupation, and encouraging collaborative working with developers. Others commented that off-site provision might not provide benefits to local residents.
- 3.16 Further detail, including where to view the full representation and who made each representation, is provided in the Consultation Statement.

# New or updated evidence base

3.17 The Greater Cambridge Draft Local Plan Viability Assessment (2025) demonstrates that the draft policy is viable and hence deliverable. Furthermore, although it is recognised that the costs of BNG will vary on a site by site basis, recent proposals above 20% BNG in Greater Cambridge show that the policy approach is possible within the Greater Cambridge area and viable for major sites.

- 3.18 A draft Local Nature Recovery Strategy for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough has been prepared and is currently in the stages of public consultation (July 2025). The LNRS has produced a series of mapped spatial data setting out and describing existing natural capital assets across Cambridgeshire, different habitats and areas of priority for nature restoration etc. It also brings forward a narrative written statement which includes suggested actions aimed at enhancing and protecting natural capital in the area.
- 3.19 The production of the LNRS is a joint effort combining existing knowledge and distributed evidence in order to produce a credible new tool and a clear direction of travel for nature conservation in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. It will be a guide for the "what and where" of nature conservation, informing policy development and positive interventions, for example nature-based approaches to carbon storage, flood prevention and water (flow for nature and people). The LNRS has and continues to inform the preparation of the local plan and guide policy requirements, for example Policy BG/BG in relation to BNG by informing the delivery of biodiversity offsetting. A review of how the Local Plan relates to the LNRS is included at Appendix 1 of this Topic Paper.

# **Draft policy and reasons**

- 3.20 The draft policy can be viewed in the draft Local Plan.
- 3.21 National planning policy requires protection and enhancement for sites of biodiversity and geodiversity importance, in a manner commensurate with their statutory status or identified quality in the development plan. National Planning policy also sets out that planning policies and decisions should (amongst other requirements) contribute to and enhance the natural and local environment by minimising impacts on and providing measurable net gains for biodiversity, including by establishing coherent ecological networks that are more resilient to current and future pressures and incorporating features which support priority or threatened species.
- 3.22 Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 places a duty on all public authorities in England and Wales to have regard, in the

exercise of their functions, to the purpose of conserving and enhancing biodiversity. The LPA will ensure that new planning applications include the relevant supporting information to comply with the national validation approach for BNG; this being the minimum required information based on the Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) Planning Practice Guidance (PPG)) and the validation protocol for BNG Metric files set out by Natural England.

3.23 Cambridge City Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council have both declared climate emergencies and are committed to the protection and enhancement of biodiversity. The councils will continue to work with partners to ensure a proactive approach to the protection, enhancement and management of biodiversity identified in national/local strategies and plans such as the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS), the Cambridge Nature Network and the Cambridgeshire Green Infrastructure Strategy (2011).

#### **Biodiversity Net Gain - Evidence and strategies**

- 3.24 National Planning Practice Guidance on BNG sets out that plan-makers may seek a higher percentage than the statutory objective of 10% BNG either on an area-wide basis or for specific allocations for development unless justified, and where this is supported by local evidence, including:
  - local need;
  - local opportunities; and
  - impacts on viability for development.

#### Local need

- 3.25 The following evidence demonstrates the local need for a higher percentage than the statutory objective (the policy seeking a minimum requirement of 20% BNG for major development and, 10% for minor):
  - At a Greater Cambridge level, only 1.3% of the land area (1222.9 ha)
     comprises <u>nationally or internationally important protected areas</u>, which
     compares to <u>6.5% nationally</u>. Only <u>3.1%</u> of Greater Cambridge has any sort
     of nature designation, incorporating non-statutory nature sites.

- More widely, Cambridgeshire has one of the lowest proportions of priority
  habitats in England (less than 10%), with one of the lowest percentages of
  land designated for nature and the second lowest woodland cover at 4.8%. It
  also has one of the <u>lowest percentages of open access land and accessible</u>
  <u>natural greenspaces</u>, a deficit that has been exacerbated by rapid economic
  and population growth.
- The extent of land use change in Cambridgeshire between the 1930s and 2018 has resulted in a massive loss of grassland from 30% to less than 10% as a result of large-scale conversion from mixed farming to arable farming.
- 3.26 These deficiencies means there is a greater need to repair that loss and restore biodiversity across the area, where possible, through the planning and development process. 20% biodiversity net gain would also better support the Councils' ambition to restore biodiversity and double nature than a lower percentage requirement (Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Part 2 Recommendations Report (August 2021), p179.

## Local opportunities: major development – 20% BNG examples

- 3.27 There are examples of where 20% BNG has been/or is already planned to be delivered in Greater Cambridge on major developments, demonstrating that meeting such a target is both possible and viable for major development within the Greater Cambridge area.
- 3.28 Examples in Greater Cambridge include, but are not limited to:
  - The Design Guide for the Welcome Trust (S/4329/19/COND21)
  - Waterbeach New Town (S/0559/17/COND10(n))
  - Phase 2, Granta Park RM (21/05165/REM)
  - Cambridge Cancer Research Hospital (23/00240/FUL)
  - The Way, Melbourn (23/02467/FUL approved)
  - Granta Park (21/03822/FUL)
  - Voland, Twenty Pence Road, Cottenham (22/01993/FUL)

#### **Local opportunities: minor development – BNG examples**

- 3.29 There are currently no green field examples of where a minor development has achieved 20% or more biodiversity net gain, without resorting to buying offsite credits. A worked example is of an illustrative minor development is provided below:
  - A two-dwelling development on a green field site. The final development will have no public open space, or shared assets between the two dwellings. The opportunities on site to deliver a viable BNG gain of 10% are minimal due to the following factors:
  - The building footprint, plus driveway and other sealed surfaces will score 0 biodiversity units.
  - All "green" land within the residential curtilage can (currently) only be classified as vegetated garden (valued similarly to arable cropland), with no tree planting or pond creation allowed to be included within the postintervention calculations.
- 3.30 This means that the likelihood of the developer having to buy offsite credits is very high even at the mandatory net gain of 10%. The most common type of credit bought is 'other neutral grassland'. These types of credits average £27,000 per credit plus VAT and legal fees. Meaning that a significant percentage of the capital outlay of the development of the type described will be purchasing offsite BNG credits. If a 20% requirement is imposed on minor development this will effectively double the cost of BNG to that project. Minor sites will have significantly smaller profit margins than major development, meaning there is a question of viability and unreasonableness when applying a 20% biodiversity net gain to minor development.
- 3.31 Therefore, it is the view of GCSP officers that it would be unreasonable to require 20% net gain on minor developments.

#### Impacts on viability

3.32 The draft Local Plan viability evidence demonstrates that the BNG requirements set out in the draft plan policy are viable alongside other policy requirements proposed.

#### Onsite and strategic offsite provision

- 3.33 Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act (as amended by the Environment Act 2021) places a duty on all public authorities who operate in England to consider how they can conserve and enhance biodiversity; in complying with this duty all public authorities must "have regard" to any relevant Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS). Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) is a key component of the Environment Act 2021, which sets priorities for nature recovery in the country in response to the national biodiversity decline.
- 3.34 LNRS's are a spatial strategy developed by a 'Responsible Authority' (RA) as set out by DEFRA; the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) is the RA for the county. Cambridgeshire County Council has been contracted to deliver the LNRS in collaboration with Natural Cambridgeshire (Local Nature Partnership) as a key partner. National policy requirements to protect and enhance ecological networks support the approach of requiring offsite habitat enhancement to align with <a href="Cambridgeshire">Cambridgeshire</a> and <a href="Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy">Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy</a>.
- 3.35 The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough LNRS has been designed to act as a guide to the most effective actions and locations for nature recovery; it includes a Local Habitat Map which is intended to guide and inform planning and nature recovery activities. This map includes areas of existing biodiversity importance, including local wildlife sites and irreplaceable habitats. The councils recognise that the LNRS identifies areas where habitat creation, restoration or enhancement would be most beneficial for nature recovery and wider environmental outcomes, and that these areas play a key role in supporting the delivery of offsite gains to maximise biodiversity benefits within Greater

Cambridge. As such, the policy encourages delivery of replacement habitat offsite within areas identified within the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy priority areas.

#### **Biodiversity Net Gain provider sites in Greater Cambridge**

- 3.36 There are a number of Biodiversity Net Gain provider sites in Greater Cambridge, at time of writing these are:
  - Land on the South Side of Elsworth Road
  - Coton Countryside Reserve
  - Flack Field
  - Fleam Dyke
  - Lower Valley Farm
  - Land at Yen Hall Farm
  - Land on the West Side of Coploe Road
- 3.37 A map is available on the Council's website: <u>Biodiversity Net Gain offsite</u> providers South Cambs District Council.
- 3.38 Therefore, while the policy aim is to focus net gains on-site (as per national policy approach), the councils recognise that on smaller sites in particular greater biodiversity gains may be achieved by pooling contributions towards larger scale off site projects (which may favour placing a proportion, or all, BNG offsite away from public access). This type of site establishment directs habitat creation to the places where it's needed most, such as nature recovery networks, areas supporting rare species, or locations that link existing habitats and protected sites. This targeted approach helps build more resilient ecosystems and supports national and local nature recovery goals.

#### **Biodiversity Gain Hierarchy**

3.39 The Biodiversity Gain Hierarchy (BGH) guides the process of achieving BNG which can be achieved through onsite biodiversity gains, registered offsite biodiversity gains or statutory biodiversity credits. The Biodiversity Gain Hierarchy is distinct from, but complementary to, the mitigation hierarchy set out in

paragraph 186(a) of the National Planning Policy Framework which states that a planning application should be refused if significant harm to biodiversity resulting from the development cannot be avoided (through locating on an alternative site with less harmful impacts), adequately mitigated, or, as a last resort, compensated for.

#### Management of secured habitat (conditions/obligations)

3.40 The councils will secure habitat enhancement and creation measures and, its long-term management either through the imposition of planning conditions or where BNG is provided on land outside of the applicant's control, by obligations. The legal agreement for on-site or significant on-site BNG must be funded and secured for 30 years, as set out in national guidance. National guidance also sets out that for development which provides significant on-site enhancements, applicants need to describe how they will maintain and monitor the habitat enhancement and, should submit a <a href="Habitat Management and Monitoring Plan">Habitat Management and Monitoring Plan</a> (HMMP) with the biodiversity gain plan.

# **Protection of Existing Biodiversity and Geodiversity**

#### GCSP Biodiversity assets/sites

3.41 Greater Cambridge has a range of important biodiversity and geodiversity sites, most being of local significance. The Local Plan policies map identifies SSSIs and Local Nature Reserves. The LNRS identifies a wider definition of Assets of Biodiversity Importance.

#### Irreplaceable habitats

- 3.42 Irreplaceable habitat within Greater Cambridge includes but is not confined to ancient woodlands; ancient and veteran trees; and lowland fens.
- 3.43 Ancient woodland is defined as an area that has been wooded continuously since at least 1600 AD; it includes ancient semi-natural woodland and plantations on ancient woodland sites (PAWS) and is irreplaceable habitat. Such areas exist within Greater Cambridgeshire, for example Sheep's Green Local Nature Reserve (including the population of veteran willow trees at Sheep's green/Coe

Fen) and West Cambridge Hundreds (including Hayley Wood, Gamlingay Wood, Waresley and Gransden Woods, Eversden Wood and Kingston Wood). Ancient woodlands and veteran trees represent an important constituent of green corridors across the district since they have a high inherent biodiversity value and contribute to landscape diversity; for example veteran willow pollards alongside rivers and floodplains which provide unique features vital for biodiversity.

- 3.44 Development in clearings, or to be made without the felling of trees within Ancient Woodland will be refused (unless proposal assessed to be permitted due to exceptional circumstances) as open ground, both temporary and permanent, is an important component of ancient woodlands.
- 3.45 Where a proposal involves the loss or deterioration of ancient woodland or, ancient or veteran trees the existing condition of the ancient woodland or ancient or veteran tree, when the merits of the development proposal are assessed, will not be taken into account. The existing condition is not a reason to give permission for development; a woodland or tree in poor condition can be improved with good management.

#### Recreational impacts on designated biodiversity and geodiversity sites

- 3.46 The national policy principles referred to above regarding protection of sites of biodiversity value by implication extends to impacts arising from recreational use. We recognise that this is a significant issue and note that many local sites are not in favourable condition or active management as well as suffering from recreational pressures.
- 3.47 At the draft plan stage while elements of the Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Strategy is still being developed, the Councils are proposing to apply Natural England's Strategic Alternative Natural Greenspace standards of 8ha provision per 1,000 population on sites of 50 or more dwellings. At Proposed Submission stage addressing recreational impacts on designated sites may be set out within policies BG/GI and at BG/EO, considering further the relationship of such a requirement with specific open space standards.

- 3.48 Applicants should ensure that consideration is given to both habitat and species constraints and opportunities, and have due regard to:
  - Statutory legislation: the Conservation of Habitats and Species (Amendment) (EU Exit) Regulations 2019, Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended) and, Protection of Badgers Act 1991 (as amended)), and also
  - Non-statutory protection: Species and Habitats of Principal Importance (Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 – specifically Section 41 of this act).

## Additional alternative approaches considered

3.49 Require 20% BNG for minor and major development – This alternative is not the preferred approach, as in practice it is often not deliverable or viable for smaller sites to deliver even 10% BNG onsite (smaller sites constrained by available open space have fewer opportunities to deliver biodiversity net gain and will likely require an off-site solution even when delivering a minimum of 10% biodiversity net gain).

# Response to main issues raised in representations

- 3.50 Support for, as well as concerns about, the policy exceeding 10% national mandatory BNG were received. National Planning Practice Guidance on BNG sets out that plan-makers may seek a higher percentage than the statutory objective of 10% BNG on an area-wide basis or for specific allocations for development where this is supported by local evidence. Greater Cambridge has a relatively low level of designated sites and priority habitats compared with other English districts; this deficiency means there is a greater need to repair that loss and restore biodiversity across the area, where possible, through the planning and development process.
- 3.51 The draft policy approach aims to increase the provision for nature, to help address biodiversity losses due to development and to create additional opportunities for people to interact with nature. The Councils have sought to provide robust justification for the amended draft Policy approach for 20% net

gain for major development and 10% for minor development in Greater Cambridge, through evidence, analysis of local data and reasoned justification of the implementation of the policy on practice. It may be viable for some major developments to deliver higher targets and there are examples of proposals achieving greater than 20% BNG in Greater Cambridge. However, 20% BNG has been demonstrated to be deliverable for major development in the context of the Greater Cambridge Area through whole plan viability testing and example in practice, and the policy makes clear that viability will be considered as set out in national planning policy and guidance.

- 3.52 Concerns about how BNG will be calculated were acknowledged. The assessed measurement of BNG (over the pre-development biodiversity value) will be measured using the statutory version of the biodiversity metric tool which enables baseline units for a site (forecast for when the proposed development is in place) to be compared with its post intervention situation. Scoring biodiversity mitigation through this metric gives weight for local mitigation but also for siting BNG at strategically important sites across wider geographies; the balancing of both aiding in the most appropriate outcome for BNG from the development proposal.
- 3.53 The Councils will verify the accuracy of the biodiversity value calculations and consider the merits of any off-site net gain measures with reference to strategic locations identified within the Cambridge Nature Network, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy, or Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Strategic Initiative Area. <a href="Evidence supporting the draft plan">Evidence supporting the draft plan</a> highlighted that due to the way biodiversity net gain is calculated, there are anecdotal concerns that there may sometimes be a margin of error that falls within the 10% threshold for BNG.
- 3.54 As such, a key concern is that a 10% biodiversity net gain may not deliver net gain, but possibly result in meeting an older metric of 'no net loss' for biodiversity onsite. As such a biodiversity net gain requirement of 20% for major development safeguards against that margin of error to deliver more credible outcomes for BNG in Greater Cambridge.

- 3.55 Regarding off-site provision of biodiversity: BNG can be achieved on-site, off-site or through a combination of both measures; the policy sets out that the Councils will seek to achieved BNG on-site wherever this is feasible and effective and only secure BNG off-site when on-site options have been exhausted. However, it is recognised that on some sites practical, sustainable ecological enhancement may not be viable.
- 3.56 Representations proposed that the policy and objectives should be strengthened to guide development away from sensitive areas and refuse development that has adverse effects. This is aspect is covered by the policy, ensuring that development proposals which have a direct or indirect adverse effect on sites of biodiversity or geological importance will not be permitted, and that exceptions will only be made where the public benefits significantly outweigh any adverse impacts.
- 3.57 Concerns that the policy only relates to controlling the impact of development not improving existing sites were considered. The draft plan takes an integrated strategic planning approach to biodiversity in the local plan, seeking to protect and enhances biodiversity in many ways; for example, creating new habitat, supporting the restoration of degraded areas, encouraging the delivery of offsite BNG within areas identified within the LNRS priority areas and, supporting the development of green infrastructure providing a range of benefits to the environment and local communities (see also policy GI/GI).
- 3.58 The BNG system itself is a mandatory approach to development and/or land management (<u>under Schedule 7A of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990</u> (<u>as inserted by Schedule 14 of the Environment Act 2021</u>), that aims to leave the natural environment in a measurably better state than it was beforehand; developers can achieve BNG through onsite enhancements, offsite biodiversity units, or statutory biodiversity credits, with legal agreements ensuring long-term compliance.

3.59 Finally, the Councils are committed to the protection and enhancement of biodiversity and will work with partners to ensure a proactive approach to protection, enhancement and management of biodiversity when considering development proposals; supporting sustainable development and ensuring delivery of the minimum requirements for BNG as set by the policy (unless development proposal is exempt). No Change to policy approach.

# **Further work and next steps**

3.60 Review the comments received on the draft Local Plan prior to preparing proposed submission version, alongside any further evidence or changes to national or local policy. GCSP will continue to engage with local stakeholders on the preparation of and consultations on any relevant local strategies, such as the Cambridge City Council Biodiversity Strategy mid-term review and Climate Change Strategy.

# 4. Policy BG/GI: Green Infrastructure

#### Issue the Plan is seeking to respond to

4.1 There is a need to enhance and expand the green infrastructure network in Greater Cambridge. The term green infrastructure encompasses a wide range of multi-functional green and blue spaces and other natural features, urban and rural, which can deliver a wide range of environmental, economic, health and wellbeing benefits. For people, green infrastructure provides recreational space bringing mental and physical health benefits, which will also reduce visitor pressure on the more vulnerable nature sites. For wildlife, green infrastructure can provide connectivity and corridor functions, there is potential to allow for the connection of disparate sites where linear features such as cycleways are lined with hedgerows, trees or drains and thus help reverse species decline and support an increase in biodiversity.

#### How the issue was covered in the First Proposals consultation

- 4.2A policy approach was proposed in the First Proposals consultation. The Proposed approach and full representations received can be viewed here: Policy BG/GI: Green infrastructure | Greater Cambridge Shared Planning.
- 4.3 The First Proposals was supported by topic papers, which explored the context, evidence and potential alternatives and the preferred approach in greater detail:

# Policy context update

- 4.4 There have been changes to the national or local policy context from that which informed the First Proposals, these being:
  - The 2021 Environment Act has introduced a requirement for local areas to produce Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS). LNRS are a new system of spatial strategies for nature introduced as a key component of the Environment Act 2021, aiming to set priorities for nature recovery across England. These spatial strategies are being developed by 'Responsible Authorities' (RA) as set out by DEFRA, the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough

- Combined Authority (CPCA) is the RA for the county. The CPCA has contracted the responsibility to Cambridgeshire County Council to develop the LNRS in collaboration with Natural Cambridgeshire (Local Nature Partnership) as a key partner.
- The Green Infrastructure Framework was launched by Natural England in January 2023. The framework provides guidance, standards, and tools for local authorities and developers to support the delivery of green infrastructure. The Green Infrastructure Standards are a key component of the Green Infrastructure Framework. They define what good green infrastructure looks like by setting out the attributes of green infrastructure (e.g. accessibility, quantity, quality and type) and including a standard for developing a green infrastructure strategy.

#### Summary of issues arising from First Proposals representations

- 4.5 Broad support for the policy intention was expressed within the representations from a range of individuals, organisations and developers, with comments that multi-functional, connected, green infrastructure is a key part of a successful spatial strategy.
- 4.6 Comments also included that the policy direction was good but ambiguous and needed clarification, including how it relates to other Aims and policies within the Plan and to Natural England's Accessible Natural Greenspace Standards. Comments that green infrastructure doesn't respect boundaries, encouraging partnership working, and the need for clear funding mechanisms for delivery.
- 4.7 Some developers commented that the policy should be a recommendation not a requirement, should recognise some sites may not be able to deliver due to locational constraints, site size and viability, that development should not be opposed where reasonable steps have been taken to protect and incorporate GI. Some comments from individuals expressed concern how the policy would be delivered via the planning process to ensure contributions will invest in strategic initiatives, and that the policy approach did not include a standard for measurement or achieved performance of developments.

- 4.8 There was widespread support for the green infrastructure initiatives, with many comments about specific initiatives including suggested amendments to their boundaries, joining up with other initiatives such as National Trust's Wicken Fen Vision, and proposing other ecological measures for inclusion.
- 4.9 Comments suggested the policy should consider the additional recreational pressure arising from developments, encourage increased access to green spaces through joining up spaces, and that all homes without gardens must have easy access. Comments included that the policy lacked specific proposals for improving public access and connectivity, including for horse riding.
- 4.10 Further detail, including where to view the full representation and who made each representation, is provided in the Consultation Statement (2023).

#### New or updated evidence base

**Greater Cambridge** Green Infrastructure Strategy: Emerging Strategy & Standards 2025

- 4.11 This strategy develops and recommends local GI standards and targets to inform and support the new Greater Cambridge Local Plan, based on the national Green Infrastructure Standards advocated by Natural England adjusted as appropriate to reflect local needs and opportunities.
- 4.12 The emerging approach to the Strategy is set out in the following documents:
  - Volume 1 Emerging Strategy & Standards
  - Volume 2 Supporting Evidence
- 4.13 In addition to a set of proposed Green Infrastructure standards, emerging approaches to developing other potential Green Infrastructure standards are also outlined which are continuing to be explored by the Councils (see next steps in

Volume 1). This further work will be completed ahead of the Proposed Submission plan consultation stage.

#### **Draft Policy and reasons**

4.14 The draft policy can be viewed in the Draft Local Plan.

#### **Green infrastructure** provision & design standards

- 4.15 Green infrastructure is a natural environment feature that can address many of the Local Plan's themes. This policy will require all development proposals to include green infrastructure to provide a range of benefits appropriate to its type, scale and location.
- 4.16 It is important that new developments provide green infrastructure to meet the green infrastructure needs arising from the development's occupants. The Councils have been working to translate Natural England's Green Infrastructure Framework (NEGIF) at a local level to develop a suite of green infrastructure standards applied through the policies in this Local Plan theme to ensure the quantity, accessibility and quality of green infrastructure provided through development. Published in 2023, the NEGIF offers a new and innovative way to plan for GI. Its complexity means that we are still working to confirm a locally justified approach that is clear and proportionate to different scales of development. At this draft plan stage the policy approach forms a work in progress position; further work will be done to confirm a refined position for the Proposed Submission stage.
- 4.17 Applying an externally derived green infrastructure design standards framework within the policy will allow for a for consistent approach to green infrastructure design which is informed by best practice. A number of green infrastructure standards exist. The current policy approach proposes that the Building with Nature Standards are adopted as a benchmark for assessing the suitability of green infrastructure proposals associated with major development. The Building with Nature Standards Framework includes 12 Standards that

together define a benchmark for "what good quality GI looks like" The Building with Nature Standards Framework are applied as a Green Infrastructure planning and design checklist for planning applications, in a way which is proportionate to the nature and scale of proposed development.

# Supporting existing green infrastructure assets and proposed green infrastructure strategic initiatives

- 4.18 At the First Proposals stage the Councils identified, via the Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Final Report (2021), 14 area specific strategic initiatives to enhance the green infrastructure, drawing on extensive evidence and engagement with local partners. The identified Strategic Initiatives drew on and are aligned with the Cambridge Nature Network, and more widely Natural Cambridgeshire's other landscape-scale priority areas within Greater Cambridge.
- 4.19 The emerging Local Nature Recovery Strategy has been developed since the identification of the Strategic Initiatives, and its nature focused opportunities are mapped at a more granular level. However, similar to the Strategic Initiatives, the draft LNRS has drawn on the Cambridge Nature Network, and Natural Cambridgeshire's other landscape-scale priority areas, such that the Councils' GI initiatives match well with the emerging LNRS, albeit they have a broader focus.
- 4.20 Having identified the existing Greater Cambridge green infrastructure network and proposed enhancements via the area-specific and dispersed strategic green infrastructure initiatives, we want to see all development protect and contribute to their enhancement, including through the design of development and through financial contributions.
- 4.21 Delivering these initiatives will take time. There may be a range of projects that will help deliver each initiative, with different projects potentially being led by different organisations. Significant partnership working will be required to achieve each initiative; they will also require funding from a range of sources. Explicitly identifying these initiatives and their objectives in the Local Plan will not restrict development in the broad areas they cover. Instead, it will enable us to ensure

that the design of development within these priority initiative areas contributes to delivering the initiatives' long-term priorities. Contributions where space is not delivered on site will be used. Contributions will be calculated using the Indicative Capital Costs for Accessible Greenspace which will be informed by the Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Strategy and will include the establishment, enhancement and the on-going management cost.

### Additional alternative approaches considered

4.22 No additional alternative approaches identified.

## Response to main issues raised in representations

- 4.23 Comments relating to specific green infrastructure initiatives suggested alteration to the boundaries of the strategic green infrastructure initiatives as shown on the map were considered. However, the strategic green infrastructure initiatives relate to general strategic initiatives for a given area and were not intended to be spatially specific or function as a policy boundary to protect existing green infrastructure. Therefore, it would not be appropriate to alter these boundaries to include/exclude specific parcels of land.
- 4.24 Representations, particularly those from developers, proposed that the policy should function as a recommendation and not a requirement. This suggestion has not been implemented, as the aim is to provide the strongest support for green infrastructure. Therefore, the draft policy has been drafted in a manner so that the policy requirements are not recommendations.
- 4.25 Comments regarding recreational pressure, and specific recommendations regarding access to green space are addressed in policy BG/BG and BG/EO respectively. Requests for specific mentions of horse riding are considered to be too detailed within the scope of this high level policy.

4.26 Finally concerns regarding the need for the policy to consider additional recreational pressure arising from new developments were acknowledged. This aspect will be covered in the policy through the implementation of Green Infrastructure Standards which will include quantity standards for green infrastructure. Once the evidence base in finalised, the requirement to adhere to these standards and requirements will be incorporated into this policy.

# **Further work and next steps**

4.27 Continue work on the evidence base, developing the Greater Cambridge
Green Infrastructure Strategy while reviewing the comments received on the draft
Local Plan prior to preparing the proposed submission version, alongside
completed evidence and any changes to national or local policy.

# 5. Policy BG/TC: Improving Tree Canopy Cover and the Tree Population

#### Issue the Plan is seeking to respond to

- 5.1 Planting more trees of the right species in the right location, or allowing for natural regeneration, can bring a wide range of climate, biodiversity and wellbeing benefits.
- 5.2 Trees provide important ecosystem services to people from shading, microclimate establishment, air purification, water and soil management. Trees are also aesthetically pleasing elements within both urban and peri-urban environments, contributing to and providing habitat for wildlife thus contributing to supporting biodiversity.
- 5.3 Low tree population and tree canopy cover is recognised as a weakness within the ecological network of Greater Cambridge, both in the rural agricultural areas typified by large open fields lacking boundary features, and in more urban areas which pre-date the current requirements.

# How the issue was covered in the First Proposals consultation

- 5.4A policy approach was proposed in the First Proposals consultation. The Proposed approach and full representations received can be viewed here: Policy BG/TC: Improving Tree Canopy Cover and the Tree Population | Greater Cambridge Shared Planning.
- 5.5 The First Proposals was supported by topic papers, which explored the context, evidence and potential alternatives and the preferred approach in greater detail:

## Policy context update

#### **Changes in National policy**

5.6 The consideration for existing trees and woodlands in the context of planning and new development within updated National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) (December 2023) is set out within Section 12 'Achieving well-designed and beautiful places' and Section 15 'Conservation and Enhancing the Natural Environment. Changes to the NPPF requires Local Planning Authorities to make new streets tree-lined.

#### **National regulations**

5.7 The Environmental Targets (Woodland and Trees Outside Woodland) (England) Regulations 2023 implements the Environment Act target of 16.5% tree cover by 31 December 2050.

#### Summary of issues arising from First Proposals representations

- 5.8 There was broad support for the objectives and priorities for improving tree canopy cover and tree population was expressed within the representations from a range of individuals, organisations and developers, noting the existing low level of tree cover in Cambridgeshire, with comments that policies must be robust to protect trees and to deliver enhancements through development.
- 5.9 Comments were made proposing specific tree canopy cover requirements on all new development, with the inclusion of ongoing maintenance, and replacement of trees when felled. Comments noted the importance of planting the right tree species in the right location. Comments were expressed by one parish that a community forest or strategic plan is needed with allocated sites within the district, linking existing ancient woodland habitats, providing wildlife corridors.
- 5.10 Concerns from some developers on the wording stated the policy was contradictory stating both that "all trees should be protected" and "only trees of value should be protected", and that policy detail is vague and did not provide

- details on when its applied. Additionally, there were requests for policy flexibility on tree removal due to disease, age or safety concerns.
- 5.11 Further responses requested a more flexible approach applied to the policy, balancing priority for tree planting with provision of sustainable development, suggesting an explicit policy direction toward "trees of value" rather than blanket protection and balancing tree removal against the benefits of bringing development forward.
- 5.12 Further detail, including where to view the full representation and who made each representation, is provided in the Consultation Statement.

#### **New or Updated Evidence base**

#### **National context**

- 5.13 The Urban Forestry & Woodland Advisory Committee recommended, based on a study 'The Canopy Cover of England's Towns and Cities: baselining and setting targets to improve human health and well-being' (2017), that a target of at least 20% overall tree canopy cover for a local authority area, or where the target is already met the aim should be to increase tree canopy cover from the current baseline.
- 5.14 The Woodland Trust (2023) Policy Paper <u>'Trees and Woods: At the heart of Nature Recovery In England'</u> recommended that local authorities should ensure that tree-lined streets and access to nature-rich woodlands are guaranteed in all new housing developments through a minimum of 30% tree-canopy cover for a development area, including retaining mature trees (this to be revised up or down, depending on local opportunities and constraints).

#### **Cambridge City context**

5.15 The Cambridge City Council Tree Strategy 2016-2026 includes a target for achieving a 19% urban tree canopy cover by 2050 based on 17% baseline cover. A technical report <u>'Valuing the Urban Forest of Cambridge'</u> (2020-2021) was produced was produced for Cambridge City Council, as part of the Interred

Nature Smart Cities 2 Seas project in order to help plan and manage the city's urban forest. The report found that Cambridge tree canopy covers about 20.1% of the city (13.3% trees and 6.8% shrubs). The report suggested that: "...It would be highly beneficial to Cambridge to seek to improve the level of canopy cover over the long term through priority planting schemes and maintenance of the current tree stock" (pg.32).

#### **Greater Cambridge context**

- 5.16 There is no baseline tree canopy information, strategy or target for South Cambridgeshire. However, South Cambridgeshire has identified a priority of increasing tree canopy cover in it is Doubling Nature Strategy.
- 5.17 The Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Study Part 2 Recommendations Report (September 2021) identified expanding Greater Cambridge's 'urban forest' as one of 14 Strategic Initiatives for improving Greater Cambridgeshire's Green Infrastructure Network to address gaps in provision and inequalities in distribution: "Increase tree canopy cover and its distribution, by protecting the existing tree canopy and planting new trees using locally appropriate species, to help settlements adapt to climate change and sustainably enhance the urban environment for people and wildlife".

#### **Cambridgeshire County Council context**

- 5.18 Adopted streets and roads in Cambridge City form around 9% of the land area of the city and contribute a similar proportion of the tree canopy. Highway trees are owned by Cambridgeshire County Council but have been managed by the City Council. The percentage tree canopy cover for streets and roads, and the contribution of this type of cover to the overall tree canopy cover in South Cambridge is not currently evidenced.
- 5.19 <u>Cambridgeshire County Council Interim Corporate Tree and woodland</u>
  strategy and action plan was approved in October 2022. This Strategy is for Cambridgeshire County Council trees, woodland and hedgerows and describes how the council manages the trees and hedgerows they have responsibility for and how they will increase canopy cover on their property. The vision of this

strategy is to expand, protect and improve Cambridgeshire County Council trees, woodlands and hedgerows and how they can connect people to nature, support the economy, combat the climate crisis and recover biodiversity. The principle of "right tree in the right place" is also a core element of the strategy; it seeks to ensure that as far as possible, only tree species appropriate to the local ecology are planted, and that these will only be planted in appropriate locations. The County Council are currently undertaking a Tree Canopy Mapping study which will set targets for tree and hedgerow planting and how this will be delivered.

#### **Recommendations from the Sustainability Appraisal**

5.20 The First Proposals Sustainability Appraisal stated that the First Proposals policy approach would be preferred as it provided a balance between promoting tree planting, protecting existing trees and hedgerows, whilst respecting that woodland is not always the most appropriate landscape or habitat feature. It considered an alternative option, which is incorporated into the current policy approach, to set a requirement for tree canopy cover in new development as not preferable. The reasoning being that it high canopy cover requirement could mean that woodland would dominate a development site's landscape and biodiversity provision, at the expense of a more biodiverse mix of habitats and landscapes. (See below for more on this).

# **Draft policy and reasons**

- 5.21 The draft policy can be viewed in the Draft Local Plan.
- 5.22 The benefits of trees in the urban environment is well documented with trees playing an important role in the health, social framework and economic sustainability of an area. Additionally, green infrastructure, sustainability, and ecosystem services are all dependent on the significant contribution of trees in the urban forest. Local Planning Authorities (LPAs) have a statutory duty to consider, and ensure adequate provision is made, for the protection and planting of trees when granting planning permission for proposed development. National Planning Policy highlights trees and urban tree cover as implicitly linked to other

key concepts; this is emphasised and highlighted within the National Planning Policy Framework.

#### **Tree Canopy Cover**

- 5.23 Canopy cover (also widely referred to as tree canopy cover, urban tree cover and urban canopy cover), is defined as the area of leaves, branches, and stems of trees covering the ground when viewed from above. It is a two dimensional metric, indicating the spread of the crown across an area. Large-canopied tree species provide a wider range of benefits because of the larger surface area of their canopy. Increasing canopy cover rather than just an increase in the number of trees will lead to a measurable increase in canopy cover across Greater Cambridge and protect against the loss of existing canopy cover. The policy ensures that development proposals increase tree canopy cover, whilst also enhancing treescape and protecting existing trees of value.
- 5.24 Considering the national and local evidence context set out above, the 30% minimum future canopy cover proposed by the policy is in accordance with best practice and guidance, including a locally defined baseline and the minimum of 30% tree canopy cover on new development sites as recommended by the Woodland Trust. The requirement is to be achieved evidenced by the requirement of an arboricultural impact assessment and a tree protection plan and/or a hedgerow survey to be submitted prior to the determination of an application and, by submission of a council approved Tree Canopy Cover Assessment.
- 5.25 While the First Proposals Sustainability Appraisal advised against a specific canopy cover target, the Councils consider that the updated evidence above justifies the draft plan approach. Additionally, if a scheme can demonstrate significant ecological, historical, landscape or operational reasons to justify a canopy requirement of less than 30% on site the policy allow for an alternative percentage of canopy provision to be agreed with the LPA.

#### **Measurement of Tree Canopy Cover**

- 5.26 All applications will provide an assessment of existing canopy cover area (m2) using BS5837 tree survey [ground cover] and, in addition major development proposals will submit a tree canopy cover assessment in accordance with the Greater Cambridge Tree Canopy Cover Assessment Calculator. The Tree Canopy Cover Assessment Calculator is being developed by officers and will be published with the submission Joint Greater Cambridge Local Plan; several examples of approaches to Canopy Cover Assessments exist and have been reviewed by officers as part of the development of the Greater Cambridge Tree Canopy Cover Assessment. Such examples include (but are not limited to):
  - Colchester Local Plan (2022) Canopy Cover Assessment Guidance
  - Wycombe District Council Local Plan (2019) <u>Canopy Cover</u>
     <u>Supplementary Planning Document</u>
  - Cornwall Council Climate Emergency Development Plan Document
     (2023)
- 5.27 A Tree Protection Plan for retained trees can calculate the anticipated retained canopy cover.

#### Design

5.28 Trees make an important contribution to the quality and character of the built environment; considering treescape upfront ensures a better end design. Trees provide focal points, landmarks and a sense of place, they have a positive impact on physical and mental wellbeing and offer economic benefits through having the potential to increase residential and commercial property value in Greater Cambridge by improving the local environment. The economy also benefits through improvements to the environmental performance of buildings due to cost reduction in heating and cooling. The Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Strategy Volume 1 1: Emerging Strategy & Standards Appendix E references relevant tree design guidance.

#### **Veteran or ancient trees**

- 5.29 Ancient and veteran trees can be individual trees or groups of trees within wood pastures, historic parkland, hedgerows, orchards, parks or other areas. They are often found outside ancient woodlands and are irreplaceable habitats. Veteran trees are particularly valuable for biodiversity due to the large amount of deadwood that they may contain. These trees are defined by the NPPF as 'A tree which, because of its age, size and condition, is of exceptional biodiversity, cultural or heritage value'.
- 5.30 All ancient trees are veteran trees. Not all veteran trees are old enough to be ancient but are old relative to other trees of the same species, with very few trees of any species reach the ancient life-stage. For an explanation of the approach to be taken to development proposals affecting ancient and veteran trees, and ancient woodland, see policy BG/BG.

#### **Buffer zones**

5.31 A number of the woodland SSSIs in Greater Cambridge have been identified as being under significant recreational pressure – including Wimpole Woods, Hardwick Wood, Hayley Wood and Papworth Wood. Creating buffers around existing woodlands will help to control and mitigate the level of impact.

#### **Hedgerows**

5.32 Hedgerows are an important landscape feature, providing visual amenity, ecological value and may have historic importance (as part of wider designed landscapes or be keys to the history of the landscape by identifying former field boundaries, settlements or highways). Hedgerows growing on, or next to, land used for agriculture are provided legal protection under the Management of Hedgerows (England) Regulations 2024 which came into force on 23 May 2024.

#### New planting-tree species and diversity

5.33 Planting more trees of the right species in the right location, or allowing for natural regeneration, can bring a wide range of climate, biodiversity and wellbeing benefits. The "right tree in the right place" is an established principle for sustainable tree planting (<u>UK Forestry Standard (UKFS)</u>, and it means

considering the local wildlife, landscape and soil type when selecting species and locations to ensure trees or hedgerows benefit their surroundings and will not cause damage to the local environment (natural, built and historic) in the long term.

#### **Best Practice Guidance**

- 5.34 Proposals for planting and management of trees and urban green features to increase and maintain urban Tree Canopy Cover in Greater Cambridge should be shaped by best practice guidance such as:
  - Trees & Design Action Group Green Infrastructure Guide
  - Natural England Green Infrastructure Planning & Design Guide.
- 5.35 It is recommended that proposals also consider relevant research reports such as:
  - London 2019 Green Roof Report.

## Additional alternative approaches considered

5.36 At First Proposals, one of the alternatives which was not considered was to set a specific requirement for tree canopy cover in new development and was not the preferred approach as high canopy cover requirements could mean that woodland would dominate a development site's landscape and biodiversity provision, at the expense of a more biodiverse mix of habitats and landscapes. However, the policy has been informed by updated evidence (National Regulations and Evidence and the Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Strategy, 2025) which has informed the draft policy and provides evidenced justification for the draft policy approach to set a specific minimum future canopy cover of 30% on site, and which also supports a target of 20% canopy cover by 2050 for the Greater Cambridge area as a whole.

## Response to main issues raised in representations

5.37 Comments suggested that the policy propose specific tree canopy cover requirements on all new development, with the inclusion of ongoing maintenance and replacement of trees when felled. The draft policy considered this suggestion

along with updated evidence and the policy draft now requires major development to demonstrate, via a Tree Canopy Cover Assessment, how development will achieve a minimum future canopy cover of 30% on site, along with requiring the long term maintenance of any newly planted trees (via planning conditions and/or obligations as appropriate). The First Proposals policy direction indicated that the policy would require development proposals to provide appropriate replacement tree or hedgerow planting, where felling is proved necessary. Extant policy 71: Trees (Cambridge Local Plan) has been carried forward to ensure the draft policy requires appropriate tree/hedgerow species to be planted in the vicinity where felling is approved.

- 5.38 Comments suggested that a community forest or strategic plan is needed with allocated sites within the district, linking existing ancient woodland habitats, providing wildlife corridors. The development of all allocations in the plan has taken account of existing biodiversity features including trees, alongside consideration of opportunities to enhance and expand the green infrastructure network, drawing on our identified Green Infrastructure initiatives. We have now done a further check of the draft LNRS to consider the overlap with the emerging plan. The Councils aim to include clear green infrastructure ambitions for within strategic allocations at the Proposed Submission stage, which may include woodland proposals where appropriate.
- 5.39 Developers raised concern that the policy was contradictory stating both that "all trees should be protected" and "only trees of value should be protected", and that policy detail is vague and did not provide details on when its applied: The councils will protect trees of current and future amenity value. Trees, groups of trees and woodland will be assessed by the Councils in accordance with the amenity assessment (Policy P2) <a href="Cambridge City Councils tree strategy">Cambridge City Councils tree strategy</a> (2016-2026) or successor document.
- 5.40 In relation to requests for policy flexibility on tree removal due to disease, age or safety concerns, the councils recognise that in some specific instances felling of existing trees or hedgerows may be necessary to meet wider placemaking objectives. In order to determine whether felling or significant surgery to trees or

hedgerows is acceptable, the amenity value of the tree(s) and/or hedgerows, condition and potential lifespan will be weighed against the safety from removal, the protection of other important site features or any more general benefits of a new development.

## **Further work and next steps**

5.41 Review the comments received on the draft Local Plan prior to preparing the proposed submission version, alongside any further evidence and any changes to national or local policy. GCSP will continue to engage with local stakeholders on the preparation of and consultations on any relevant local strategies, such as the Cambridge City Council Urban Forest Strategy.

## 6. Policy BG/RC: River corridors

## Issue the Plan is seeking to respond to

6.1 Our rivers, and in particular the River Cam and its tributaries, provide a variety of critical roles in Greater Cambridge. In additional to their functional role in water storage, biodiversity and green infrastructure, they contribute greatly to our landscape and townscape and cultural heritage, as well as our tourism economy. The local plan needs to provide a policy framework to balance this wide range of issues.

## How the issue was covered in the First Proposals consultation

6.2A policy approach was proposed in the First Proposals consultation. The Proposed approach and full representations received can be viewed here: The First Proposals was supported by topic papers, which explored the context, evidence and potential alternatives and the preferred approach in greater detail:

## Policy context update

6.3 There have been no changes to the national or local policy context from that which informed the First Proposals, and is set out in the Biodiversity and Green Spaces Topic Paper (2021).

## **Summary of issues arising from First Proposals representations**

- 6.4 General support for the policy direction was expressed by a range of individuals, organisations and environmental bodies, particularly for the protection and restoration of river corridors, including chalk streams and floodplains, due to their importance for biodiversity, flood management, and landscape character.
- 6.5 Comments on applying the policy to development included support for ensuring proposals protect the setting, views and historic significance of river corridors, with specific calls for appropriate building setbacks to allow for natural processes and flood resilience. Concerns were raised about the impact of high-rise buildings on biodiversity and visual amenity, particularly from lighting and overshadowing. While improved public access was welcomed, several respondents highlighted risks of overuse and habitat degradation, recommending impact assessments and collaboration with landowners to balance recreation and environmental protection.
- 6.6 Suggestions to strengthen the policy included expanding its coverage to additional watercourses such as the Ivel tributary, Hobson's Brook, Wilbraham River and River Great Ouse. There was support for recognising aquifer-fed brooks and for including Riverscape Opportunity Areas to encourage habitat creation. Re-naturalisation projects, such as those at Logan's Meadow, were widely supported for their environmental and flood management benefits. Respondents also called for greater provision for equestrian access, alignment with green infrastructure policies and a mapped nature recovery network with restoration targets.
- 6.7 Broader concerns included pressures from tourism and commercial river uses, the environmental impact of large infrastructure projects such as the wastewater treatment plant relocation, and the need for clearer policy wording to ensure effectiveness. Anglian Water proposed a Memorandum of Understanding to support water resource projects benefiting the Cam.

6.8 Further detail, including where to view the full representation and who made each representation, is provided in the Consultation Statement.

#### New or updated evidence base

6.9 No new or updated evidence has been produced since the First Proposals stage, with the existing evidence base set out in the Biodiversity and Green Spaces Topic Paper (2021).

#### **Recommendations from the Sustainability Appraisal**

6.10 The Sustainability Appraisal stated that the current policy approach would be preferred as it positively plans for the protection and enhancement of river corridors. Having no policy was not considered to be a reasonable alternative.

## **Draft policy and reasons**

6.11 The draft policy can be viewed in the Draft Local Plan.

#### Further information supporting draft policy approach

- 6.12 River corridors in Greater Cambridge are under increasing pressure from development, recreation and environmental change, which can affect their ecological function, landscape character and cultural value. The policy responds to these pressures by setting out principles for development along the River Cam and its tributaries, covering design, biodiversity, access and renaturalisation. Its approach reflects priorities identified in the Greater Cambridge Landscape Character Assessment and the Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Part 2 Recommendations Report. The policy will seek to address the following key roles, challenges and opportunities for our river corridors:
  - A defining role in our landscape, heritage and townscape: The Greater
    Cambridge Landscape Character Assessment identifies the key landscape
    features of the Cam and other river corridors in Greater Cambridge, and
    sets out guidance for integrating development into the landscape.
    Development proposals should consider this guidance to inform its
    response to this policy.

- Supporting habitats: The River Cam is designated as a county wildlife site in recognition of the river's importance in linking semi-natural habitats, including ecologically-designated sites such as Stourbridge Common Local Nature Reserve and Sheep's Green and Coe Fen Local Nature Reserve, with the wider countryside of South Cambridgeshire. The Integrated Water Management Study notes the critical impact of water abstraction on the health of the chalk streams. The Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Final Report identifies revitalising the chalk streams network as a priority strategic green infrastructure initiative, with a focus on restoring the chalk streams' natural shape, form and flow, alongside the critical need to reduce the impact of our water abstraction on the chalk streams (see CC/WE).
- Water storage: Our rivers are a source of flood risk. Restoration of natural flood plains where practicable and provision of green infrastructure can help reduce flood risk along the rivers itself and beyond. Wet woodland will self-set and grow where conditions are right and management allows.
   Providing the right conditions for trees to grow in appropriate locations in river corridors can support flood risk mitigation and biodiversity.
- Supporting leisure, recreation and health: the river Cam in particular
  provides leisure access for walking and cycling. The Green Infrastructure
  Opportunity Mapping Final Report identifies an opportunity to enhance this
  role to create a continuous Cam Valley Trail, and also to enhance
  connections between the river and other green spaces in and around
  Cambridge.
- Supporting tourism: The River Cam is an international tourist attraction, drawing many visitors each year, including for punting and travelling further afield by boat. We want to continue to support this role, but this needs to ensure that it does not harm the other roles noted above.
- 6.13 Recognising the varied role that the River Cam corridor plays, the Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Final Report identifies the Cam Valley (split into three parts including north of the city, within the

city, and south of the city) as a strategic opportunity for enhancement of Greater Cambridge's green infrastructure network.

## Additional alternative approaches considered

6.14 No additional alternative approaches identified.

## Response to issues raised in representations

- 6.15 Comments raised on the protection of river corridors have been addressed through clearer and more detailed policy wording. The final policy now requires development to assess and respond to views, protect biodiversity and character and support the re-naturalisation of rivers and restoration of natural floodplains.
- 6.16 In particular, the policy scope has been broadened to address all river corridors within Greater Cambridge.
- 6.17 Concerns about environmental impacts, including from lighting, high-rise development and recreational pressure, have been reflected through strengthened requirements to balance access with habitat protection. The policy also supports improved walking and cycling routes, including the Cam Valley Trail, where appropriate.
- 6.18 Suggestions for greater clarity and alignment with wider strategies have informed the inclusion of references to the Greater Cambridge Landscape Character Assessment and the Local Nature Recovery Strategy.

## Further work and next steps

6.19 Review the comments received on the draft Local Plan prior to preparing the proposed submission version, alongside any further evidence or changes to national or local policy.

## Policy BG/PO: Protecting open spaces

## Issue the Plan is seeking to respond to

- 6.20 Open spaces, regardless of ownership, are a key aspect of high-quality urban environments and are fundamental to the character of an area. Attractive, accessible and well-designed open space can support and enhance the appearance of an area, creating more desirable places to live and underpin good growth. Open spaces and recreation facilities provide people with a place to relax and socialise as well as encouraging healthier lifestyles by providing opportunities for sport, informal play and daily encounters with the natural environment. Open spaces not only help support the health, social and cultural well-being of local communities but also help support strategies to mitigate the adverse effects of climate change.
- 6.21 An essential part of the character of Cambridge stems from its many green spaces, trees and other landscape features, including the River Cam. In South Cambridgeshire, open spaces are an integral part of a village's character and charm. These spaces not only play an important role in promoting both active and passive sport and recreational activities but also provide valuable amenity space and support for biodiversity. Their protection is therefore an important matter which the Local Plan needs to address.

## How the issue was covered in the First Proposals consultation

- 6.22 A policy approach was proposed in the First Proposals consultation. The Proposed approach and full representations received can be viewed here: Policy BG/PO: Protecting open spaces | Greater Cambridge Shared Planning.
- 6.23 The First Proposals was supported by topic papers, which explored the context, evidence and potential alternatives and the preferred approach in greater detail: <a href="Document library">Document library</a> | Greater Cambridge Shared Planning.

## Policy context update

6.24 There have been no changes to the national or local policy context from that which informed the First Proposals, and is set out in the Biodiversity and Green Spaces Topic Paper (2021).

## **Summary of issues arising from First Proposals representations**

- 6.25 Broad support for the policy intention was expressed within the representations from a range of individuals, organisations, and public bodies. Comments were received that the policy needs to be considered against competing policy requirements, that it needs to address the future stewardship of open space and recognise its value in reducing recreational pressures on vulnerable sites and the heritage value of sites. Comments were made that the policy should recognise that open spaces are historic and part of the historic environment (not just viewed in terms of green infrastructure). A number of comments were made by individuals and parish councils regarding the impacts of development on landscape and open space in specific locations.
- 6.26 Further detail, including where to view the full representation and who made each representation, is provided in the Consultation Statement.

## **New or Updated Evidence base**

#### **Protected Open Space Review (2025)**

- 6.27 The Protected Open Space review (see Appendix 2 of this Topic Paper) is a desk-based review which demonstrates that the open spaces identified for protection in both of the existing local plans continue to meet the criteria to justify designation as a Protected Open Space, Protected Village Amenity Area (PVAA) or Local Green Space. The review also identifies any potential refinements/amendments (e.g. boundary changes) to designated sites, alongside the identification and assessment of whether there are any further / new areas within the settlement boundary which warrant designation. The review also aims to adopt a uniform approach to protecting open spaces across Greater Cambridge by applying a common Protected Open Space designation to sites across Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire.
- 6.28 The review of sites within the adopted local plans demonstrated that the majority of Protected Village Amenity Areas, Local Green Spaces from the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan 2018 and Protected Open Spaces from the Cambridge Local Plan 2018 continued to pass the tests to warrant designation. A large number of PVAAs were converted to become Protected Open Space. The review identified and recommended amendments to the extent of some designated sites. A small number of sites no longer met the criteria to warrant continued designation.
- 6.29 The proposed designations within the Draft Local Plan and Policies Map have been updated to reflect the outcome from this work.

#### **Recommendations from the Sustainability Appraisal**

6.30 The Sustainability Appraisal stated that the current policy approach would be preferred as it plans positively for open space. The option of having no policy was not considered to be reasonable alternative.

## **Draft policy and reasons**

- 6.31 The draft policy can be viewed in the Draft Local Plan.
- 6.32 The draft policy protects open spaces from harmful development. The type of protection varies according to the type of space.

#### Further information supporting draft policy approach

- 6.33 Our settlements contain a wide variety of open spaces, including but not limited to Allotments & Community Gardens, Amenity Greenspace, Cemeteries and Churchyards, Civic Spaces, Natural & Semi Natural Green Spaces, Outdoor Sports Facilities, Parks and Gardens. These make significant contributions to the character of places but also provide important local amenities. It is important that these are protected from development that could have an adverse impact on these qualities. The draft policy approach to identify and protect open spaces was chosen to positively plan for open spaces, ensuring the continued provision of existing open spaces and associated benefits.
- 6.34 The function and important characteristics of different types of open space vary, therefore it was deemed necessary to have differing policy criteria for the different types of open space to reflect their function and ensure that the important characteristics are adequately protected from potential harm that may arise from new developments. The existing designations of Protected Open Space, Protected Village Amenity Area (PVAA) and Local Green Space in the Cambridge Local Plan and South Cambridgeshire Local Plan respectively have been effective, and no justification exists to replace these designations per se. Therefore, the designations have been reused in the draft policy. The designations remain reasoned and justified having been updated by the Protected Open Space Review (2025) and amended to apply a consistent approach across Greater Cambridge, including converting a large number of PVAAs into Protected Open Space.

## Additional alternative approaches considered

6.35 No additional alternative approaches have been identified.

## Response to main issues raised in representations

- 6.36 There were suggestions to strengthen this policy to reflect environmental aspects. However, it is considered that the environmental aspects of any development involving open space would be adequately covered by polices within the Biodiversity and Green Spaces chapter.
- 6.37 In response to comments highlighting the need for assessment on appropriate basis within the policy, the draft policy seeks to provide a clear and unambiguous guidance on how to treat proposals within differing contexts.
  Caveats have been included within the policy that allow for exceptions where adequate reprovision is provided and where there is an educational need.
- 6.38 While it is acknowledged that many open spaces form part of the historic environment, it is considered that the historic environment aspects of any development involving open space would be adequately covered by other policies within the Great Places chapter.
- 6.39 Finally, objections were raised that highlighted the policy is contrary to Green Belt losses arising from recent and proposed development. Representations on this topic are not pertinent to this emerging policy and should be considered against policy GP/GB.

## Further work and next steps

6.40 Review the comments received on the draft Local Plan prior to preparing the proposed submission version, alongside any further evidence or changes to national or local policy.

# 7. Policy BG/EO: Providing and enhancing open spaces

## Issue the Plan is seeking to respond to

6.41 The importance of greenspace has been recognised for the wide range of benefits it brings, from improving human health, providing cleaner air, increasing opportunities for biodiversity to mitigating the negative impacts of climate change. This recognition means that it is vital new residential developments and large employment area provide open spaces to support their growth, in either a rural or urban setting. In rural parts, there may be limited opportunities to access sports and recreation facilities while in urban, more densely populated areas there may already be existing pressure on these spaces. New development which will create additional demand for these spaces should contribute to these spaces accordingly.

## How the issue was covered in the First Proposals consultation

- 6.42 A policy approach was proposed in the First Proposals consultation. The Proposed approach and full representations received can be viewed here: <a href="PolicyBG/EO">Policy BG/EO</a>: <a href="Providing and enhancing open spaces">Planning</a>.
- 6.43 The First Proposals was supported by topic papers, which explored the context, evidence and potential alternatives and the preferred approach in greater detail: <a href="Document library">Document library</a> | <a href="Greater Cambridge Shared Planning">Greater Cambridge Shared Planning</a>.

## Policy context update

6.44 The national policy context from that which informed the First Proposals has changed. The Green Infrastructure Framework was launched by Natural England in January 2023. The framework provides guidance, standards, and tools for local authorities and developers to support the delivery of green infrastructure. The Green Infrastructure Standards are a key component of the Green Infrastructure Framework. They define what good green infrastructure

looks like by setting out the attributes of green infrastructure (e.g. accessibility, quantity, quality and type) and including a standard for developing a green infrastructure strategy.

## **Summary of issues arising from First Proposals representations**

- 6.45 General support for the policy direction from a range of individuals, organisations, developers, and public bodies, with new provision of open spaces widely supported.
- 6.46 Comments regarding the application of this policy for new development included those suggesting that: the policy should be applied on a site-by-site basis; smaller developments should ensure provision of open space; onsite provision not off-site financial contributions should be required; new dwellings should have provision for food growing space (this point was also supported in response to the quick questions); open space should be provided within reasonable walking distance of residents' homes; standards should continue to differentiate between Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire to reflect the differences between the two areas; SUDs should not be treated as open space; and open space should include provision for biodiversity. A few developer comments wanted more clarity regarding the specific policy requirements.
- 6.47 Broader comments about open spaces included suggestions that the policy direction under BG/GI should also be applied to BG/EO, and that multifunctionality should not reduce amount of overall public space; comments highlighted how open spaces can form an important part of the setting of heritage assets; support for provision of allotments, concern relating to multistorey buildings which risk dominating open space and affecting the character of Cambridge; requests for provision of new skateparks and growing spaces; and requests that open space was provided to meet the needs of equestrians. A few developers identified that their site would provide open space to meet needs.
- 6.48 Further detail, including where to view the full representation and who made each representation, is provided in the Consultation Statement.

### New or updated evidence base

#### **Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Strategy** 2025

- 6.49 This strategy develops and recommends local open space standards and targets to inform and support the new Greater Cambridge Local Plan, based on existing provision, national standards and best practice, adjusted as appropriate to reflect local needs and opportunities.
- 6.50 The emerging approach to the Strategy is set out in the following documents:
  - Volume 1 Emerging Strategy & Standards
  - Volume 2 Supporting Evidence
- 6.51 In addition to a set of proposed Green Infrastructure standards, emerging approaches to developing other potential Green Infrastructure standards are also outlined which are continuing to be explored by the Councils (see next steps in Volume 1). This further work will be completed ahead of the Proposed Submission plan consultation stage.

#### **Greater Cambridge Interim Sport Strategy 2025**

6.52 This strategy assesses the need for indoor leisure facilities, playing pitches, outdoor courts and rinks in Greater Cambridge. The strategy uses growth projections to predict requirements for increased demand and future need in Greater Cambridge taking into account planned growth.

#### **Recommendations from the Sustainability Appraisal**

6.53 The sustainability appraisal stated that the current policy approach would be preferred as it positively plans for open space. Having no policy was not considered to be reasonable alternative.

## **Draft policy and reasons**

6.54 The draft policy can be viewed in the draft Local Plan.

#### Further information supporting draft policy approach

- 6.55 Open spaces, regardless of ownership, are a key aspect of high-quality urban and rural environments and are often fundamental to the character of an area. Attractive, accessible and well-designed open space can support and enhance the appearance of an area, creating more desirable places to live and underpin good growth. Open spaces and recreation facilities provide people with a place to relax and socialise as well as encouraging healthier lifestyles by providing opportunities for sport, informal play and daily encounters with the natural environment. They can also offer people the opportunity to grow their own food in allotments and community gardens and orchards. Multifunctional spaces can help people to socialise and relax as well as encourage healthier lifestyles. These areas can also assist with climate change strategies by reducing local heat islands in urban areas. The policy approach will support the delivery of large-scale green spaces which may also include water spaces, in order to provide a range of benefits in one location such as providing recreation space, providing habitats for wildlife, reducing heat island effects and reducing flood risk.
- 6.56 As referred to in Policy BG/GI, the Councils are continuing to develop evidence to inform the standards for the quantity, quality and accessibility of greenspace provision which will be applied by the policy to help ensure that new developments help deliver the benefits described above. Development proposals will be subject to minimum quantity, quality and accessibility greenspace standards as part of seeking to implement Natural England's Green Infrastructure Framework. The quantity standards can be met by direct provision of new and/or improved open spaces on and/or off-site, or through an appropriate financial contribution to off-site provision as appropriate.
- 6.57 It is being explored whether additional quantity standards can be applied to high-density residential developments and commercial developments. High-density residential developments typically consist of flatted development and the occupants are less likely to have access to a private garden. Furthermore, due to a smaller site area, high-density residential developments are also less capable of providing GI onsite. Therefore, in addition to the baseline residential

greenspace quantity standard, the option of an additional high-density standard is being explored to ensure that sufficient GI is provided to the occupants of these developments in close proximity to their place of residence. To allow workers to enjoy the benefits of GI during the working day, a GI standard for commercial development is also being explored.

6.58 Where on-site provision is not possible, contributions will be sought for off-site GI provision to enable the benefits of GI to be delivered. These contributions will be informed by the indicative figures which will be informed by evidence the Councils are continuing to develop.

## Additional alternative approaches considered

6.59 No additional alternative approaches identified.

## Response to main issues raised in representations

- 6.60 Comments raised relating to the accessibility of open space have been addressed through the open space standards used by the policy which aim to ensure that any open space provision is accessible for the intended users.
- 6.61 Representations, particularly those from developers, proposed that the open space standards used should continue to differ between Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire. This suggestion has not been fully implemented as one of the reasons for making a joint local plan for Greater Cambridge is to ensure that there is a consistent approach to planning across both areas. However, the open space standards used allow for site-specific local constraints and opportunities associated with the nature of the proposed development to be taken into consideration.
- 6.62 Representations, particularly those from developers, also raised concerns about the lack of clarity relating to the open space standards. The Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Strategy and Greater Cambridge Interim Sports Strategy have now been implemented within the policy to provide additional

clarity about the open space provision requirements for new development which was missing at First Proposals. Further work will be completed prior to Proposed Submission to provide a full set of open space and green infrastructure standards.

## **Further work and next steps**

6.63 Review the comments received on the draft Local Plan prior to preparing the proposed submission version, alongside any further evidence or changes to national or local policy.

# Appendix 1: Review of Greater Cambridge Local Plan and draft Local Nature Recovery Strategy

How the Draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan has regard to the Cambridge and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy – explanatory note

## 1. Summary

- 1.1 This explanatory note illustrates where the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough LNRS affects the draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan (GCLP) and demonstrates how the plan has regard to the LNRS: how the draft local plan evidence, strategy and policies are aligned with the LNRS and support delivery of Biodiversity Net Gain.
- 1.2 The note has been produced recognising the draft LNRS has been confirmed relatively late in the process of producing the draft Local Plan. As such it forms a cross-check of the two documents and supporting evidence. Ahead of the Proposed Submission stage and following confirmation of the finalised LNRS the Councils will explore further the opportunities to integrate LNRS priorities within the Local Plan. The councils will continue to work in partnership (including within their roles as supporting authorities) with Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority, Cambridgeshire County Council and other stakeholders involved in the preparation of the LNRS to ensure that the draft plan policies take a proactive approach to the protection, enhancement and management of biodiversity identified in the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS).
- 1.3 The LNRS and draft local plan evidence base for Biodiversity and GI are broadly aligned: At the First Proposals stage the Councils identified 14 area specific strategic initiatives to enhance the green infrastructure, drawing on extensive evidence and engagement with local partners. The identified Strategic Initiatives drew on and are aligned with the Cambridge Nature Network, and more widely Natural Cambridgeshire's other landscape-scale priority areas within Greater Cambridge. The emerging Local Nature Recovery Strategy has been developed since the identification of the Strategic Initiatives, and its nature focused opportunities are mapped at a more granular level. However, similar to the Strategic Initiatives, the draft LNRS has drawn on the Cambridge Nature Network, and Natural Cambridgeshire's other landscape-scale priority areas, such that the Councils' GI initiatives match well with the emerging LNRS, albeit they have a broader focus.

- 1.4 The local plan spatial strategy and sites are aligned with the LNRS: The foundations of the draft GCLP GI opportunities strategies are based on existing and potential future biodiversity opportunities for nature and people, this approach is broadly in alignment with the LNRS. All site allocations within the draft GCLP that are close to or overlapping with areas that could become of particular importance for biodiversity (ACB) include policy requirements for specific biodiversity enhancements where the ACB action is relevant to the development. Many of these site-specific requirements connect strongly with LNRS priority actions.
- 1.5 **Draft local plan policies support delivery of the LNRS and Biodiversity Net Gain:** Policy requirements in the draft local plan align with the LNRS, for example Policy BG/BG in relation to BNG by informing the delivery of biodiversity offsetting (which can contribute to LNRS outcomes).

## 2. The duty to "have regard" to relevant Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS) and the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough LNRS

## The duty to have regard to the relevant LNRS

- 2.1 Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act (as amended by the Environment Act 2021) contains a specific duty on all public authorities to "have regard" to relevant Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS). The LNRS regulations create a "supporting authority" role for local authorities (see Appendix 1b: Legal and Policy Integration), it is under this role that Cambridge City Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council (the Councils) have been engaging with other stakeholders and also feeding into the process for the LNRS for Cambridge and Peterborough.
- 2.2 National policy and Guidance sets out how local authorities should 'have regard' to the LNRS in plan making (see also Appendix 1b):
  - where land has been identified as having particular potential for habitat creation or nature recovery within Local Nature Recovery Strategies, proposals should contribute towards these outcomes (NPPF paragraph 159)
  - plans should identify, map and safeguard areas identified by national and local partnerships for habitat management, enhancement, restoration or creation (NPPF paragraph 192(a))
  - consider the priorities set out in the relevant local nature recovery strategy when determining how their local plan should contribute to and enhance the local and natural environment, and should be aware of those areas mapped and identified in the relevant Local Nature Recovery Strategy and the measures proposed in them and consider how these should be reflected in their local plan. In doing so, they should consider what safeguarding would be appropriate to enable the proposed actions to be delivered, noting the potential to target stronger safeguarding in areas the

local planning authority considers to be of greater importance. (PPG- Natural Environment Paragraph 046)

- 2.3 Drawing on above, the note considers how the councils have had regard to the duty, how the LNRS has informed the plan making process and how the content for the draft GCLP relates to it, under the following headings:
  - Strengthens the Evidence Base for Biodiversity and Green Infrastructure
    - Informs the Spatial Strategy
    - Influences Local Plan Policies
    - Supports Delivery of Biodiversity Net Gain

#### The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough LNRS

- 2.4 The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) is the Responsible Authority (RA) for the county. CPCA contracted the responsibility to develop the LNRS to <u>Cambridgeshire County Council</u> in collaboration with Natural Cambridgeshire (Local Nature Partnership) as a key partner. South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridge City Council are both supporting authorities for the LNRS. The draft LNRS public consultation period ran between 18 July-11 September 2025 and the LNRS is intended for publication by the end of December 2025.
- 2.5 Local planning authorities should also consider the priorities set out in the relevant LNRS when determining how their local plan should contribute to and enhance the local and natural environment (this is set out in National Planning Guidance-see 2.2). The Statement of Biodiversity Priorities (see Appendix 1a) for the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) is entitled <u>'Part two priorities and Actions'</u>. The LNRS priorities are:
  - Natural landscapes: The LNRS nature network map combines the six Natural Cambridgeshire priority landscapes with the district priority natural landscapes 'to support nature recovery at scale' (pg.13). These are areas where habitat creation, restoration or enhancement are most beneficial for nature recovery and wider environmental outcomes and which can play a key role in supporting the delivery of offsite gains to maximise biodiversity benefits within Greater Cambridge.
  - Beyond priority natural landscapes: an action to support nature recovery across farmland and within the cities, towns and villages in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.
  - **Habitat and species:** this includes habitat actions for the local habitat priorities (see figure 1 below) to support nature recovery and also specific actions for some local priority species.

## 3. How the Draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan has regard to the Cambridge and Peterborough LNRS

#### **Evidence Base for Biodiversity and Green Infrastructure**

- 3.1 The Draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan and its evidence base has been developed working with consultants and local experts including Local Planning Authority (LPA) Ecologists.
- 3.2 The draft plan seeks to protect, enhance and expand existing biodiversity assets in the authority area. It identifies and protects the existing green infrastructure network, and sets out the strategic green infrastructure initiatives intended to enhance the green infrastructure network at a landscape scale. This aligns with <a href="LNRS vision">LNRS vision</a> to create, restore and connect

a wildlife rich, resilient, productive and sustainable landscape for both people and nature across a large connected area.

- 3.3 In the process to the publication of the draft local plan, GCSP have:
  - Completed a Green Infrastructure (GI) Opportunities Evidence Base and identification of Strategic GI initiatives
  - Considered nature assets in reviewing sites submitted to us
  - Considered nature/GI opportunities when looking at site allocations (including the potential for the creation of new and protection of existing natural green open space and the network of green spaces and routes, landscapes, biodiversity, water bodies and heritage)
  - Considered integrated water management (which considers water resources, quality and resilience to flooding) and,
  - Considered the conservation and restoration of Chalk streams

## **Informs the Spatial Strategy**

- 3.4 At a strategic level, the strategic priority for the Biodiversity and Green Spaces policies in the Draft GCLP is to:
- "increase and improve our network of habitats for wildlife, and green spaces for people, ensuring that development leaves the natural environment better than it was before".
- 3.5 To inform the overall strategy for the plan we considered the best locations to restore our area's habitat networks and provide more green spaces, this process identified 14 strategic green infrastructure initiatives to help achieve this (see the <a href="GCLP Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Final Report">GCLP Green Infrastructure Opportunity Mapping Final Report</a> 2021). These areas drew on an understanding of existing projects and initiatives in Greater Cambridge such as the Natural Cambridgeshire Doubling Nature Vision, Cam Valley Forum restoration projects, Cambridge Chalk Stream Project, Cambridge Nature Network and Greater Cambridge Partnership Projects (for example Waterbeach Greenway).
- At a site specific level, noting that the draft LNRS was developed after publication of the Local Plan First Proposals consultation 2021, the Councils completed a 'cross check' of sites allocated within the draft GCLP (see Appendix 1d) against those specific areas identified in the <a href="Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Draft Local Nature Recovery Strategy Local Habitat Map">Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Draft Local Nature Recovery Strategy Local Habitat Map</a> for Areas of Particular Importance for Biodiversity (APIB) and Areas that could become of particular importance for biodiversity and wider environmental benefits (ACB).
- 3.7 Site allocations in the draft GCLP avoid development in areas which are critical for nature recovery: no site is in an APIB. Some sites do have ancient and veteran trees within the boundary of the site (which is irreplaceable habitat) however such trees are protected by the provisions in the draft GCLP policy BG/TC.
- 3.8 All sites close to or overlapping with areas that could become of particular importance for biodiversity (ACB) include policy requirements for specific

biodiversity enhancements (noting as below that development management policies require biodiversity net gain and inclusion of green infrastructure enhancements), where the ACB action is relevant to the development. Many of these site specific requirements connect strongly with LNRS priority actions. In particular, strategic sites including Cambridge East, Cambridge Biomedical Campus and Cambourne North require strategic scale provision of green spaces in locations that support LNRS priorities.

In summary, site allocations in the draft GCLP avoid development in areas which are critical for nature recovery, except for in very limited instances where policy mitigations are included. Site allocation site specific biodiversity requirements connect strongly with LNRS priority actions in many instances. The Councils will complete further review of sites policy wording regarding site specific biodiversity enhancements the LNRS once it is finalised, ahead of the Proposed Submission Local Plan stage.

## 4. Local Plan Development Management Policies

**Biodiversity and Green Spaces Policies** 

## Policy BG/BG: Biodiversity and Geodiversity- support for the delivery of Biodiversity Net Gain

- 4.1 In relation to the LNRS, the policy encourages the delivery of offsite BNG within areas identified within the LNRS priority landscape areas. These priority natural landscape areas provide a focus for delivery of long-term nature recovery in Cambridgeshire (and Peterborough) and for targeting investment in the natural environment. They highlight those areas where BNG and offsetting would be best focused and can assist developers with identifying potential sites which could be used either for habitat banking or off-site BNG.
- 4.2 The policy controls development affecting sites and species of biodiversity and geodiversity importance, requiring applicants to provide survey information and site assessment prior to the determination of an application that is proportionate to the likely severity of impacts for proposals (where development may affect biodiversity including sites of biodiversity importance, habitats and species of principal importance or sites of geodiversity). A LNRS is not a species conservation strategy and it does not specifically target species conservation but instead aims to improve the overall environment and biodiversity by creating, enhancing and restoring habitats. However, as the Cambridge and Peterborough LNRS does identify 144 species as locally and nationally important, further work on GCLP policy BG/BG will be needed prior to submission to consider how the local plan can have regard to the LNRS species priorities.

#### Policy BG/GI: Green Infrastructure

- 4.3 In relation to the LNRS, this policy identifies the revitalisation of the chalk steam network as one of the fourteen strategic green infrastructure initiatives which are a priority for enhancing strategic green infrastructure across Greater Cambridge. This policy supports the LNRS strategic initiative which recognises the importance of the internationally rare chalk streams within Cambridgeshire and Peterborough and to collaborate with cross-boundary partners to conserve and restore them.
- 4.4 The Councils are continuing with further work on GI standards and how they can best support delivery of the strategic initiative areas. The current draft policy approach for green and blue infrastructure may be refined at Proposed Submission stage of the Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

#### Policy BG/TC: Improving Tree Canopy Cover and the Tree Population

- 4.5 In relation to the LNRS, the policy sets out that for all development where there are trees on, or immediately adjacent to the site, that proposals must preserve, protect and enhance existing trees and hedgerows. The policy also ensures existing and newly planted trees, hedgerows and other vegetation can mature and be maintained in the long term, that any new trees should be an appropriate species for the conditions of the site (including consideration of climate change and should support species diversity and incorporation of long lived trees). This policy supports several of the LNRS actions for woodlands; for example, action Wo7B to "improve management of all ancient and veteran trees, including urban / street trees, including planning for replacement with locally sourced 'plant healthy' stock that is resilient to climate change".
- 4.6 The Councils' emerging preferred approach is to apply a tree canopy cover target for major development at 30% to support the delivery of the area-wide ambition of 20% tree canopy cover. Increasing tree canopy cover and its distribution (by protecting the existing tree canopy and planting new trees using locally appropriate species) helps settlements adapt to climate change and sustainably enhances the urban environment for people and wildlife. These benefits are recognised in the LNRS in supporting action U1B which seeks to increase the urban tree canopy by planting native and climate resilient tree species in streets, parks, and other public spaces to provide habitat, reduce urban heat island effects, and improve air quality.
- 4.7 The policy also sets out that proposals should be informed by urban greening best practice guidance at the time of the application, this supports the LNRS strategic aim to encourage existing, new and large developments to incorporate wildlife friendly features by introducing urban greening interventions. The LNRS recognises that public open spaces and gardens provide the basis for the "urban forest" (which is supplemented by street trees and road verges), the Greater Cambridge Green Infrastructure Opportunity

Mapping Study Part 2 Recommendations Report (September 2021) identified expanding Greater Cambridge's 'urban forest' as one of 14 Strategic Initiatives for improving Greater Cambridgeshire's Green Infrastructure Network.

#### **Policy BG/RC: River Corridors**

4.8 In relation to the LNRS, the policy requires development along river corridors to protect and enhance the existing landscape (of river corridors), referring to both the Greater Cambridge Landscape Character Assessment and the Local Nature Recovery Strategy for guidance. This policy supports the LNRS urban landscape enhancement action U1A which seeks enhancement to the biodiversity value of parks and green spaces within our cities, towns and villages including river corridors (as well as other green open spaces: allotments, churchyards, country parks, public parks and gardens, community gardens).

## Other Polices in the draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan

- 4.9 The impacts from climate change and the principles of adaptation and mitigation are embedded throughout the emerging GCLP and the LNRS. For example, the draft GCLP includes policies which:
  - take a holistic approach to water management, water supply, wastewater, flood risk and water quality in a coordinated way with the aim of ensuring the long-term sustainability of water resources and ecosystems (Policy CC/IW), this supports the LNRS strategic aim to promote integrated water management techniques considering water resources, quality, and resilience to flooding,
  - Policy CC/SD) provides guidance for proposals to meet the requirements for environmental sustainability, mitigate the effects of or contribute to adaptations to climate change,
  - Policy CC/CS: recognises that promotion of nature-based solutions, where natural systems are protected, restored and managed can assist with the protection of carbon sinks while at the same time providing benefits for biodiversity and health and wellbeing and,
  - Policy CC/RE ensures that development which generate energy from renewable and low-carbon sources, including associated infrastructure, grid connections and storage will not cause significant, irreversible adverse impacts that cannot be mitigated, including cumulative and cross-boundary impacts on (but not limited to) biodiversity (including protected habitats and species and ecological networks; water quality and flood risk; the best and most versatile agricultural land (Grades 1, 2 and 3a).

#### Wider work undertaken by GCSP

4.10 The GCSP Natural Environment Team recognised in 2022 the imminent need to provide reliable solutions for developers to offset environmental damage through development. Guidance in the Biodiversity Supplementary Planning

Document (SPD) was updated in June 2022, which included the emerging Environment Act legislation changes requiring any new developments to improve nature in the area by at least 10%.

4.11 In 2023/24 GCSP worked in partnership with Cambridgeshire County Council, The Wildlife Trust, Cambridge Past, Present and Future, and others to identify where habitats could be created or enhanced, enabling the creation of a network of new Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) habitat banks across the Greater Cambridge area.




## **Appendix 1a: What are Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS)**

A key component of the Environment Act 2021 introduced a legal requirement for local areas to produce mandatory spatial strategies for nature: Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS), aiming to set priorities for nature recovery across England. This established LNRS's (once created) as the first statutory spatial strategies for nature in England.

Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS) are spatial strategies which plan, map and create priorities for nature recovery and enhancement in a given area. There are 48 strategy areas, each appointed to a responsible authority (RA) to lead on the preparation of the LNRS for their area.

There are two main components that make up the LNRS: a written document called the 'Statement of Biodiversity Priorities' and an online map called the 'Local Habitat Map'.

A LNRS identifies opportunities for nature recovery and enhancement, agrees priorities for nature recovery and, proposes actions in the locations where it would make a particular contribution to achieving those priorities. LNRS do not prohibit development or other land uses. They are an 'enabling mechanism' which set out where interventions can happen to best support nature recovery and which bring local stakeholders together through joint working towards a shared vision (the

product of this engagement being the habitat map and statement of biodiversity policies as set out in the LNRS).

There are currently no specific legal duties that require LNRS to be implemented and there are no requirements that any specific proposed action must be carried out. The proposals within the LNRS are intended to guide where the public, private and voluntary sectors focus their nature recovery efforts for greater collective impact.



## **Appendix 1b: Legal and Policy Integration**

#### **The Biodiversity Duty**

Local planning authorities have a statutory biodiversity duty under the Environment Act 2021; Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 places a duty on all public authorities (in England and Wales) to have regard, in the exercise of their functions, to the purpose of conserving and enhancing biodiversity.

This duty means that the councils must consider what action they can take to further the general biodiversity objective (being the conservation and enhancement of biodiversity in England through the exercise of functions in relation to England) and where they consider there is action to be taken, the authority must determine policies and objectives that it considers appropriate for taking action to further the biodiversity objective and must take such action.

In complying with this duty, the councils must:

- "have regard" to any relevant Local Nature Recovery Strategy, species recovery strategy and protected site strategy and,
- report on the performance of this duty (under section 40A)

Cambridge City Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council have both declared climate emergencies and are committed to the protection and enhancement of biodiversity. The councils will continue to work with partners to ensure a proactive approach to the protection, enhancement and management of biodiversity identified in national/local strategies and plans such as the Cambridge Nature Network, the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) and the Cambridgeshire Green Infrastructure Strategy (2011).

#### The NPPF and Planning Policy Guidance (PPG)

#### **NPPF**

The NPPF was updated and published 12 December 2024. Section 15 of the NPPF deals specifically with 'conserving and enhancing the natural environment', and this update added in reference to LNRS's in section 13 'protecting green belt land', (paragraph 159): "where land has been identified as having particular potential for habitat creation or nature recovery within Local Nature Recovery Strategies, proposals should contribute towards these outcomes.

#### **PPG (Natural Environment)**

The PPG on <u>protecting and enhancing the Natural Environment</u> was been updated 19 February 2025. This updated includes the addition of a new section 'Local Nature Recovery Strategies' (paras 044-048), which sets out:

 A requirement for all LPAs in England to "have regard" to local nature recovery strategies (LRNSs) in both plan-making and decisions. It states that under section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act (as amended by the Environment Act 2021), all public authorities in England have a duty to "consider how they can conserve and enhance biodiversity". "In complying with this duty all public authorities must "have regard" to any relevant local nature recovery strategy," (Paragraph 044).

- How LPAs should have regard to LNRS in plan making: LRNSs "will identify and map proposed areas for habitat management, enhancement, restoration and creation for biodiversity and the wider natural environment" and LPAs "should be aware of those areas", as well as "the measures proposed in them [LNRS] and consider how these should be reflected in their local plan". In doing so LPAs "should consider what safeguarding would be appropriate to enable the proposed actions to be delivered, noting the potential to target stronger safeguarding in areas the local planning authority considers to be of greater importance". Local Plans must demonstrate how they are contributing to nature recovery through their strategy, site choices, and policies. LPAs "should consider the priorities set out in the relevant local nature recovery strategy when determining how their local plan should contribute to and enhance the local and natural environment". The paragraph refers to paragraph 192(a) of the NPPF, which states that councils' local development plans should "identify, map and safeguard components of local wildlife-rich habitats and wider ecological networks". It also says LPAs should "promote the conservation, restoration and enhancement of priority habitats, ecological networks and the protection and recovery of priority species" as well as "identify and pursue opportunities for securing measurable net gains for biodiversity" (Paragraph 046).
- How LPAs should have regard to LNRS when it comes to planning decisionmaking: the guidance states that "it is for the decision-maker to determine what is a relevant material consideration based on the individual circumstances of the case". The guidance adds: "In cases where there is a draft local nature recovery strategy that has been consulted upon but not yet finalised and published, the draft strategy may contain useful evidential information that can support appropriate decision making" (Paragraph 047).
- The relationship between LNRSs and Biodiversity Net Gain: LNRS "will identify areas where habitat creation, restoration or enhancement would be most beneficial for nature recovery and wider environmental outcome" and can play a " critical role in supporting offsite gains to be delivered in a way that maximises biodiversity benefits, when these are required to achieve a development's biodiversity gain objective. This can help to support bigger and more joined-up areas in which our wildlife can thrive." LPA's involvement in the preparation of LNRSs can "help identify suitable offsite biodiversity gain sites" and serve as a key information source for example 'regarding strategic approaches to off-site biodiversity net gain delivery and connections to existing habitat, when local planning authorities are carrying out their functions in respect of Biodiversity Net Gain".

Paragraph 010 was also updated and now recommends that LPAs and neighbourhood planning bodies "work collaboratively with the [LRNS-] responsible authority and other partners" to prepare and agree the LRNS for their area, to "help ensure alignment" between the strategy and the local plan.

#### **Decision making**

The PPG Natural Environment section on how LPAs have regard to LNRS in planning decision making has been updated to state that an LRNS serves as "an evidence base" which contains information that may be a 'material consideration' in the planning system (Paragraph: 047 Reference ID: 8-047-20250219, PPG Natural Environment).

The guidance still states that all planning policies and decisions need to be based on up-to-date information about the natural environment and other characteristics of the area, and so LPAs can continue to draw on "river basin management plans, national landscapes management plans, green infrastructure strategies, tree and woodland strategies, and landscape character assessments. Also, that it is for the decision-maker to determine what is a relevant material consideration based on the individual circumstances of the case.



## Appendix 1c: How does an LNRS affect a Local Plan

Strengthens the Evidence Base for Biodiversity and Green Infrastructure LNRS's identify priority areas for habitat creation and restoration, existing high-value natural assets and opportunities for enhancing biodiversity.

#### Informs Local Plan Spatial Strategy and Site Selection

Local Plans must now consider:

- Avoiding development in areas critical for nature recovery
- Directing development to areas where biodiversity net gain (BNG) can align with LNRS priorities (as set out within the LNRS written statement)

LNRS local habitat maps are spatial tools, making it easier for planners to guide development while promoting ecological networks. These maps can be used to identify sites for green infrastructure corridors and biodiversity offsetting.

#### **Influences Local Plan Policies**

Local Nature Recovery Strategies will shape and strengthen environmental policies in the Local Plan. For example:

- Nature recovery corridors
- Protection and enhancement of priority habitats
- Green infrastructure networks
- Climate adaptation through ecological restoration

#### **Supports Delivery of Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG)**

The relevant primary legislation for the statutory framework for biodiversity net gain (BNG) is principally set out under Schedule 7A (Biodiversity Gain in England) of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 ("TCPA 1990"). This legislation was inserted into the 1990 Act by Schedule 14 of the Environment Act 2021 and was amended by the Levelling Up and Regeneration Act 2023.

Under the 2021 Environment Act all planning permissions granted in England (with a few exemptions) except for small sites have to (since 12 February 2024) deliver at least 10% biodiversity net gain development (unless exempt).

LNRSs play a role in the location of off-site mandatory BNG, by determining the 'strategic significance multiplier' of the statutory biodiversity metric which must be used to comply with BNG requirements under the TCPA 1990.

LNRSs provide the framework for targeting and measuring BNG:

- LNRS priorities help identify suitable sites for on-site and off-site gains
- Development proposals that align with LNRS may be viewed more favourably by planning authorities
- Local Plans should include policies requiring BNG to contribute to LNRS outcomes.

- Policy requires that proposals have site boundaries to provide landscape buffers of a minimum of 25m wide to mitigate adverse landscape impacts of built form and light pollution as well as the provision of open space and tree planting through the site as part of a landscape led masterplan. Existing hedges are to be retained.
- Existing balancing ponds are to be re-profiled and watercourse utilised and enhanced for biodiversity net gain and to address surface water flooding.
   Existing watercourses to be utilised and enhanced, with further native planting within the drainage proposals.

### **Protected Open Space Review**

Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (September 2025)

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### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Greater Cambridge Local Plan First Proposals included Policy BG/PO: Protecting open spaces, which will address how important open spaces are considered in the planning process. The policy will identify and protect open spaces, including village greens, parks, sports and recreation areas, allotments, community orchards and Protected Village Amenity Areas, and Local Green Space.
- 1.2 The purpose of this review is to demonstrate that the open spaces identified for protection in the emerging Local Plan are reasoned and justified by meeting the policy criteria. The review aims to identify whether there are any refinements / amendments needed to the designated areas identified in the adopted Local Plans and shown on the Policies Maps, alongside the identification and assessment of whether there are any new areas which warrant designation.
- 1.3 The review also aims to adopt a uniform approach to protecting open spaces across Greater Cambridge by applying a common Protected Open Space designation to sites across Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire. Sites (or parts of sites) designated as Protected Village Amenity Areas within the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan with a recreational function will be converted to Protected Open Space, with any remaining land tested to ensure it continues to fulfil the function of a Protected Village Amenity Area.

# 2. Policy Context

- 2.1 The following outlines the different types of open space designations within the existing planning policy framework of both Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire as well as the emerging policy for Greater Cambridge, the functions of each type of designation, and an overview of the relevant policies the local plans. It should be noted that sites are only designated where they are within the defined development extents and do not have to be publicly accessible.
- 2.2 'Made' (adopted) neighbourhood Plans, which form part of the Development Plan, also designate sites to protect open space. These sites have not been reviewed as they will have been tested separately through the Neighbourhood Planning process. They will be incorporated into the Local Plan designations and shown on the Policies Map for the Regulation 19 Local Plan.

### Cambridge City Local Plan

### Types of Open Space Designations

- 2.3 The <u>Cambridge Local Plan</u> (2018) utilises an all-encompassing Protected

  Open Space designation. The following open space typologies are designated
  as Protected Open Spaces within Cambridge City:
  - Allotments & Community Gardens
  - Amenity Greenspace
  - Cemeteries and Churchyards
  - Civic Spaces
  - Natural & Semi Natural Green Space
  - Outdoor Sports Facilities
  - Parks and Gardens
  - Provision for Children and Teenagers

2.4 Some open spaces are classified within more than one typology. Where this is the case, a main typology is applied.

#### **Overview of existing Policy**

- 2.5 **Policy 67: Protection of Open Space:** This policy protects Open Spaces that are identified on the policies map and any undesignated sites that fulfil at least one of the criteria used to assess open space included in the plan. The criteria to assess open space is listed in Appendix I in the Cambridge Local Plan (2018) and is also set out in this report further below.
- 2.6 The policy states that development will not be permitted if would harm the character of, or lead to the loss of, either open space of environmental or recreational importance. The policy allows for exceptions where there is equal or better reprovision of open space within walking distance of the original site or where an educational need exists.

## **South Cambridgeshire Local Plan**

#### **Types of Open Space Designations**

- 2.7 The following Open Space Designations are used within <u>South</u>

  <u>Cambridgeshire Local Plan</u> (2018):
  - Protected Village Amenity Areas (PVAAs): designated on sites within village frameworks in order to safeguard those areas of undeveloped land within villages which are important to retain. Some may have important functions for the villages such as allotments, recreation grounds and playing fields whilst others have an important amenity role in providing a setting for buildings or offer tranquil areas where there is minimum activity. Not all PVAAs have public access as some undeveloped areas which are important may be private gardens. They also vary from those which are very open to visual penetration to those which may be enclosed or semi-enclosed.

Protected Open Space Review, Greater Cambridge Shared Planning

- Local Green Space (LGS): designated for green areas of particular importance to local communities which, once designated, can prevent new development other than in very special circumstances. A LGS must hold a particular local significance, for example because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquillity or richness of its wildlife. The green area must be in reasonably close proximity to the community it serves. It must be local in character and not be an extensive tract of land. These sites can protect land outside of a development framework. A list of current LGS is provided in Appendix C of the 2018 Local Plan.
- 2.8 The South Cambridgeshire Local Plan also includes the following landscape designation to protect the setting and character of villages:
  - Important Countryside Frontage (ICF): where land with a strong countryside character penetrates or sweeps into villages or separates two parts of the built-up area, this enhances the setting, character and appearance of the village. This is done by retaining the sense of connection between the village and its rural origins and surroundings. The frontage where this interface particularly occurs is identified to indicate that the frontage and the open countryside beyond should be kept open and free from development.

#### **Overview of existing Policy**

2.9 Policy NH/11: Protected Village Amenity Areas. This policy identifies PVAAs on the Policies map. The policy states that development will not be permitted within or adjacent to these areas if it would have an adverse impact on the character, amenity, tranquillity or function of the village.

- 2.10 Policy NH/12: Local Green Space. This policy identifies LGS on the Policies map. The policy states that development that would adversely impact on the character and particular local significance placed on such green areas which make them valued by their local community. Inappropriate development, as defined in the National Planning Policy Framework, would not be approved except in very special circumstances and in discussions with the local community.
- 2.11 **Policy NH/13: Important Countryside Frontage.** This policy identifies ICFs on the Policies map. The policy states that development will not be permitted if it has an adverse impact on the connection between land with a strong countryside character and the built-up area/street scene.

## **Draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan**

### Types of Open Space Designations

- 2.12 The following Open Space Designations are proposed in the Draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan:
  - Protected Open Space (POS): adapted from the designation used within the Cambridge Local Plan (2018), the designation has now been applied to sites in both Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire. The following open space typologies are designated as Protected Open Spaces within Greater Cambridge:
    - Burial Ground and Churchyards
    - Children and Young People
    - Food Growing Spaces
    - Informal Areas of Open Space
    - Natural Open Space
    - Outdoor Sports Facilities
    - Parks and Recreation Space

- Protected Village Amenity Areas (PVAAs): will continue to be
  designated on sites within defined development extents in order to
  safeguard those areas of mainly undeveloped land within villages which
  are important to retain. This includes an important amenity role in
  providing a setting for buildings or offer tranquil areas where there is
  minimum activity. However, the designation will no longer include
  recreational sites which meet the criteria to be designated as Protected
  Open Spaces.
- Local Green Space (LGS) and Important Countryside Frontages
   (ICFs): the definitions of these designations are unchanged from the
   South Cambridgeshire Plan (2018).

#### Overview of draft Policy

- 2.13 Policy BG/PO: Protecting Open Spaces. This draft policy combines the policy approaches from the adopted Local Plans and identifies Protected Open Spaces, Protected Village Amenity Areas and Local Green Spaces on the policies map.
- 2.14 POS identified on the policies map and any undesignated sites that fulfil at least one of the criteria used to assess open space included in the plan are protected unless the existing open space can be satisfactorily replaced to an equivalent or better standard. Exceptions continue to be permitted where there is equal or better reprovision of open space within a suitable distance of the original site or where an educational need exists.
- 2.15 For identified PVAAs, development will continue to not be permitted within or adjacent to these areas if it would have an adverse impact on the character, amenity, or tranquillity of the village.

- 2.16 In relation to LGS, the policy states that development that would adversely impact on the character and particular local significance placed on such green areas which make them valued by their local community. Inappropriate development, as defined in the National Planning Policy Framework, would not be approved except in very special circumstances and in discussions with the local community.
- 2.17 **Policy GP/LC: Protection and enhancement of landscape character.** This policy continues the policy approach from the previous Local Plan and identifies ICFs on the Policies map. The policy states that development will not be permitted where it compromises the purposes of an ICF.

# 3. Approach and methodology

3.1 The following sets out in broad terms the approach and methodology used to assess the sites.

### **Approach**

- 3.2 The overall approach was a desk-based review of all the existing sites in both adopted Local Plans to check that they still met the criteria to warrant designation or identify any potential amendments (e.g. boundary changes). Consideration was given to any changes in circumstances that might have affected a site's designation. For instance, if part of a site had been developed, it could have impacted whether the site, in whole or in part, still met the relevant policy criteria. This process ensured that policy designations remained appropriate and accurately reflected current conditions.
- 3.3 To have a unified policy approach to open space across Greater Cambridge, it was additionally assessed whether sites located in South Cambridgeshire met the criteria to be designated as a Protected Open Space.
- 3.4 Further sites were identified in Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire via a desk-based review.

# Methodology

3.5 The location of a site was viewed using the interactive adopted Policies Map and the site boundaries were compared with the latest (and historic, if necessary) aerial photography / satellite images to determine whether the current designations were spatially accurate and corellated with the land use and pattern of development on the ground.

- 3.6 The assessment process involved reviewing site boundaries and checking whether any changes or amendments were necessary to ensure that each site's current circumstances were accurately reflected. To assess the sites, Google Maps Satellite Imagery, Google Streetview, and the respective Local Plan Adopted Policies Map were the primary tools used.
- 3.7 The sites were assessed against the relevant policy tests outlined in Chapter 4, and the detailed results of the assessments are provided in Appendices A to D.
- 3.8 New Protected Open Space sites were identified using a similar desktop analysis, with each site mapped and categorised into one of the protected open space typologies.
- 3.9 Note, in the process of preparing the Greater Cambridge Local Plan Policies Map some further minor amendments have been made to the boundaries of the protected open spaces, for example to follow features on the basemap; these insubstantive refinements are not outlined in this review.

# 4. Summary of Assessment

4.1 Chapter 4 outlines the assessment criteria used for each policy designation included with the Greater Cambridge Local Plan policy and provides a summary of the assessment findings.

### **Protected Open Space**

- 4.2 A number of new recreational sites have been identified and mapped; each site has been assigned a POS typology and a corresponding unique reference number.
- 4.3 Existing sites in the Cambridge Local Plan have been checked to ensure they still meet the POS criteria and whether their boundaries are correctly drawn. Note that via the review, some existing sites have been split into more than one area to reflect the types of uses present, for example, where a children's play space falls within a wider park or garden. In such instances each typology has been mapped and given a unique reference number.
- 4.4 PVAA with a recreational function have been converted to POS; they have been assigned a POS typology and unique reference number.

#### **Assessment Criteria**

- 4.5 The policy test for sites to be designated as Protected Open Space requires sites to have either environmental or recreational importance. The policy also categorises each designated site into one of the POS typologies; by definition these typologies meet the recreational and/or environmental policy criteria as follows:
  - Burial Ground and Churchyards often are of environmental importance, forming part of the setting of historically important buildings. They also provide public access to their grounds for recreational amenity use;

- Children and Young People play spaces, often with play equipment and/or amenity green space, provide recreational opportunities and, in some instances, may contribute to the local environment;
- Food Growing Spaces these include allotments and community orchards can be enjoyed recreationally for food growing and, as open spaces, may contribute to the local environment and setting;
- Informal Areas of Open Space including semi natural and amenity green spaces, these spaces are of environmental importance, adding to the local character and openness of places, and provide spaces for informal recreation;
- Natural Open Space these environmentally important spaces add to local character and, where there is public access, provide space for informal recreation:
- Outdoor Sports Facilities formal sports facilities provide for a range of recreational activities, and open sports fields can also contribute to the local environment and setting;
- Parks and Recreation Space provide access for recreational use (noting that some of these are for private communities such as university colleges). As green spaces they may also have environmental importance, forming an important part of the character of settlements.
- 4.6 As all the sites have been assigned to one of the POS typologies, they therefore meet the policy test to warrant designation as POS.

#### **Assessment results for Protected Open Space**

- 4.7 A total of 1,537 sites have been identified as meeting the criteria for designation as Protected Open Space in the Draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan.
- 4.8 Of the designated sites protected as open space in the adopted Local Plans:

- 99 PVAA within the adopted South Cambridgeshire Local Plan converted to POS (some split into more than one typology)
- 20 PVAA sites meet the POS criteria on part of the site the qualifying part(s) of the sites have been converted to POS (and the remainder of the site reassessed for retention as PVAA)
- Three sites in the Cambridge City Local Plan were found to no longer meet the criteria to be designated as protected open space
- 23 sites in the Cambridge City Local Plan have been reconfirmed with recommended boundary changes, typically as a result of new development on the site since the last review.
- 4.9 See Appendix A for the full list of changes made to PVAAs and POS, and all Protected Open Spaces proposed within the Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

# **Protected Village Amenity Areas (PVAA)**

- 4.10 Existing PVAAs in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan have been assessed whether they contain recreational land to warrant conversion to POS.
- 4.11 Sites remaining as PVAA, either in their entirety or in part, have been checked to ensure they still meet the PVAA criteria and whether their boundaries are correctly drawn.

#### **Assessment Criteria**

- 4.12 Sites were evaluated against two questions to determine whether they met the relevant policy criteria to be designated. Every site was given a red, amber or green score against both questions. To proceed to assessment, sites needed to fulfil two criteria; that the site was inside the defined development extent (identified on the Policies Map) and was mainly undeveloped land.
- 4.13 The two questions applied were:
  - 1. Is the undeveloped nature of this land important to the character of the village or for this particular part of the village?
  - 2. Does the undeveloped nature of this land provide a tranquil area where there is a minimum of activity, important to the amenity of the village or for this particular part of the village?
- 4.14 If a site scored amber or green to at least one of these questions, the criteria to be designated as a PVAA was met.

### Assessment results for Protected Village Amenity Areas (PVAA)

- 4.15 Of the 191 PVAA designated within the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan:
  - 70 PVAA remain designated as PVAA
  - 99 PVAA have become POS in their entirety
  - 20 PVAA have been reduced in size following removal of land designated POS
  - 2 PVAA no longer meet the criteria to be designated
  - 11 PVAA have been reconfirmed with recommended boundary changes, typically as a result of development on the site
  - 4.16 See Appendix B for the full list of changes made to PVAAs, and all PVAAs proposed within the Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

## **Local Green Space (LGS)**

4.17 Existing sites in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan have been checked to ensure they still meet the LGS criteria and whether their boundaries are correctly drawn.

#### **Assessment Criteria**

- 4.18 To be designated sites had to be considered Local in character and not an extensive tract of land and located within close proximity to the community it serves. The criteria used to determine whether a site should warrant designation as an LGS reflect the <a href="National Planning Policy Framework">National Planning Policy Framework</a> (paragraph 107), as follows:
  - Demonstrably special to the local community whether the site was proposed by the parish council or representations were received in support of the designation (during the preparation of the adopted 2018 Local Plan)
  - Beauty whether it makes a contribution to the character and amenity of the village
  - Historical Significance whether it makes a contribution to the setting of listed buildings and/or a conservation area
  - Recreational Value whether it provides informal open space and/or recreational value
  - Tranquillity whether it provides some feeling of remoteness and quiet contemplation
  - Richness of wildlife whether it is an area which contains a diversity of wildlife
- 4.19 If a site scored green to at least one of these questions, the conditions to be designated as a LGS was met.

### **Assessment results for Local Green Space (LGS)**

- 4.20 All of the local green spaces assessed in the review continued to meet at least one of the ICF criteria to be designated.
- 4.21 See Appendix C for the full list of LGS proposed within the Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

## **Important Countryside Frontage (ICF)**

4.22 Existing sites in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan have been checked to ensure they still meet the LGS criteria and whether their boundaries are correctly drawn.

#### **Assessment Criteria**

- 4.23 Sites were evaluated against the relevant policy criteria to determine their suitability for designation. To proceed to assessment, sites needed to fulfil two criteria; that the site was outside and adjacent to the defined development extent (identified on the Policies Map).
- 4.24 The criteria used to determine whether a site should warrant designation as an ICF consisted of two tests:
  - The first test asked whether it was land on a frontage with a strong countryside character that provides an important rural break between two nearby but detached parts of the defined development extent.
  - The second test asked whether the frontage allows land with a strong countryside character to penetrate or sweep into the built-up area providing a significant connection between the street scene and the surrounding rural area.
- 4.25 If a site scored green to at least one of the two tests, the conditions to be designated as an ICF was met.

### **Assessment results for Important Countryside Frontage (ICF)**

- 4.26 All of the existing important countryside frontages continued to pass the test to warrant designation.
- 4.27 The review identified amendments to both reduce or extend the extent of a few of ICFs.
- 4.28 See Appendix D for changes proposed to ICFs, and the full list of ICFs proposed within the Greater Cambridge Local Plan. See also Appendix E, which responds to comments made to the First Proposals consultation regarding ICFs.

## Appendix E: Issues raised in comments to the First Proposals Consultation 2021

E.1 A number of comments were received during the First Proposals Consultation in 2021 that related to designated open spaces including suggestions for new sites to be designated. Summarised below are the comments which were made along with the response.

## Summary of issue raised in comments

Two sections of The Causeway, Bassingbourn-cum-Kneesworth are an important connection between the street scene and the East Anglian Chalk landscape and should be considered for ICF designation.

### Comments highlighting this issue

57712 (Bassingbourn-cum-Kneesworth PC)

### Response

The two sections of The Causeway, Bassingbourn-cum-Kneesworth have been assessed against the policy requirements to be designated as an ICF. Neither warrant designation; the western side would not join two parts of the village's defined development extent (noting that exceptions housing schemes in this location are outside the defined development extent) and there is not a strong countryside character penetrating into the village.

All allotments should be declared statutory to ensure their long-term protection.

## Comments highlighting this issue

59245 (D Fox)

#### Response

Allotments have been designated as Protected Open Space where they meet the criteria for such designation.

### Summary of issue raised in comments

Concern that development between Linton and Little Linton would destroy the historic open landscape, compromise the separation of the settlements, and damage their individual characters. The land is also considered environmentally valuable and should be protected

The ICF designation has been retained. The site meets the definition, as the frontage allows land with strong countryside character to penetrate the built-up area, creating a significant link between the street scene and the surrounding rural environment.
