Settlement Hierarchy Study Update 2025

Introduction

0.1 The role of this evidence document, the Settlement Hierarchy Study Update 2025, is to provide a proportionate update to the 2021 Settlement Hierarchy Study which supported the Greater Cambridge Local Plan First Proposals in 2021 (First proposals Topic paper - Development Strategy (2021) p245, Appendix 1Hf). The Update informs the Settlement Hierarchy Policy S/SH in the draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan 2025. This study should be read in conjunction with the 2021 study. This is because this update does not explore the policy history/background, First Conversation and engagement, higher level policy direction and reasoning, and any alternative approaches reviewed within the study and the wider strategy document.

0.2 This update includes:

- 1. Methodology review;
- 2. Evidence update;
- 3. Review of previously proposed settlement classifications.
- 0.3 Within each of the above stages, consideration was given to representations (reps) to the First Proposals consultation to ensure they are accounted for in reviewing the methodology, updating the evidence and in reviewing proposed classifications. Each of these stages are set out below.

1. Settlement Hierarchy Study Methodology review

Review and confirmation of Settlement Hierarchy Study methodology

1.1 Having reviewed available updated data and responses from the First Proposals consultation it is considered that the methodology used in the 2021 Settlement Hierarchy Study remains appropriate and robust and is applied in this update. In particular, consideration of the methodology included:

- Definitions of all settlement categories within the hierarchy: The 2021 Study provided broad definitions of all settlement categories within the hierarchy, including differentiating between the different village categories. In defining the new settlement hierarchy tier of "Towns" it is considered that towns warrant recognition as a second tier of settlement after Cambridge and will play a different role from even the largest villages currently in the district. In addition, settlements proposed to be within the Towns category (Cambourne, Waterbeach new town and Northstowe) are already, or are planned to be once built out, larger in scale than Rural centres and to have high levels of service provision and placemaking. These purpose-built settlements are planned to have town centres, local centres, employment provision, community and leisure facilities. This is considered to form a common sense differentiation of Towns from other smaller settlements with less service provision. Along with the inclusion of Cambridge at the top of the hierarchy, it is considered that the settlement categories used in the 2021 Study remain robust.
- The Study's key evidence topics for consideration: In the identification and review of the Study's key topics for consideration: public transport accessibility, accessibility of education, village facilities, and local employment opportunities, it is considered these remain appropriate and are used to assess each settlement's scoring. In relation to transport links to the city, employment and services it is considered that the transport scoring, which encompassed public transport connections of all types, and active travel accessibility to a market town or Cambridge, is an appropriate and sound approach.
- Scoring of settlements including considering their interaction: In considering
 the inclusion of scoring the distance to the nearest service centre and how
 different settlements interact and support each other, it is important to note
 that the proposal to place settlements in a particular hierarchy category within
 the Settlement Hierarchy Study 2021 was a matter of judgement drawing on,
 but not being wholly defined by, the sustainability scoring. As such, while the

scoring may not account for the interaction of settlements, the rationale for categorisation of settlements did include this consideration where relevant. It is considered that adding specific scores for relationship with other settlements would form an overly complex methodology.

2. Evidence update

2.1 A proportionate update of the Settlement Hierarchy evidence was completed, set out below, for each evidence topic. In considering the need to update the evidence and any impact that may have, it is important to restate that the proposal to place settlements in a particular hierarchy tier is a matter of judgement, drawing on but not being wholly defined by the sustainability scoring. The updated indicators are:

Population

Updated using the latest Cambridgeshire County Council estimates, mid-2022
 LSOA data. No scoring is based on this population figure; however, it is used in the reasoning of a settlement's position within the hierarchy over all.

Transport

- Four of the seven points potentially attributable to a settlement, in relation to transport, were available relating to whether the settlement includes: train station; busway access; having a public transport stop on a Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) public transport route; active travel possible within 8km of Cambridge or a market town.
- Three points were available relating to the frequency of bus services. Bus services are subject to existing and potential future change in relation to funding and the commercial nature of routes. It is noted the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority has made its Bus Franchising scheme, as well as ongoing work regarding the emerging Greater Cambridge Transport Strategy which could impact on bus services. In reviewing the classification of settlements attention was given as to whether the judgement regarding settlement classification placed weight on this feature. Bus services

were updated using services to settlements from the published Settlement Hierarchy 2021 review, using the current available service provider website timetabling information.

Services/facilities

- Primary and Secondary schools: updated drawing on Cambridgeshire
 County Council data. One point was allocated for a settlement with a primary
 school and one point for a secondary school. As there are no changes since
 the 2021 review the scoring remains unchanged.
- **GP surgeries**: updated drawing on the NHS GP, GP related digital datasets and individual surgery websites. One point was allocated for a settlement with a GP. As there has been no change since the 2021 review the scoring remains unchanged.
- Shops and services: this evidence has not been updated, on the basis that
 the data was updated in 2021 and continues to provide a reasonable overview
 of the relative services and shops available. In reviewing the classification of
 settlements attention was given as to whether the judgement regarding
 settlement classification placed weight on this feature.

Jobs density

- Updated using Office for National Statistics (NOMIS) Census 2021 population estimates, and Business Register and Employment Survey (BRES) data 2021.
- Following the approach on the 2021 Settlement Hierarchy Study, scoring mechanism one point was allocated where the job density ratio was between 0.5 and 1.
- Two points were allocated where job density ratio was greater than 1.
- 2.2 In Summary, each settlement has been reviewed based on the data updates provided above and scores from the 2021 Settlement Hierarchy Study have been updated. Tables setting out this updated data are provided in Appendix 1 and following.

3. Review of previously proposed settlement classifications

3.1 Consideration is set out below regarding whether the 2021 Settlement Hierarchy Study rationale for each settlement category and for the classification of each settlement within each category remains valid, drawing on the updated evidence and representations to the First Proposals consultation.

Towns

Cambourne

2.2 Cambourne remains the largest settlement in the district based on current population estimates with a population of 12,295 (Cambridgeshire County Council Mid-2022 population estimates) and further planned growth at West Cambourne which will bring the population to approximately 19,650 residents. The settlement currently has several transport links to Cambridge, and these will be improved further through the delivery of the Cambourne to Cambridge GCP scheme, as well as a new train station that has been planned to be delivered as part of the East West Rail proposal. It has a wide range of shops and services including a large supermarket. Based on Cambourne's high score using the scoring mechanism, and further planned growth and infrastructure improvement, Cambourne is proposed to be regraded from a Rural Centre to a Town.

Northstowe

3.3 Northstowe is a new settlement of up to 10,000 dwellings (Northstowe Area Action Plan) which is currently under construction. The Mid-2022 population estimate for Northstowe is 3,205 and once all phases of development are completed the population is expected to reach 24,400 residents. It currently has two primary schools and a secondary school. Once the remaining phases of the area's development has been delivered it will have a town centre with shops, community, leisure, and education facilities. It is estimated that once the development is complete Northstowe will have a provision of around 6,000 jobs. It is well connected to Cambridge by the Guided Busway and the St Ives Greenway. Based on future growth that includes the delivery of greater infrastructure and service provision, it is proposed that Northstowe is categorised as a Town.

Waterbeach new town

3.4 Waterbeach new town is allocated in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan (2018) as a new settlement of 8,000-9,000 dwellings. Outline permission was granted in September 2019 for 6,500 dwellings with business, retail, community, leisure and sports uses, a hotel, schools and open spaces. A further outline permission was granted in December 2024 for delivery of up to 4,500 dwellings which also included business, retail, community and leisure uses as well as a new primary and secondary school, in addition to a sixth form centre. Waterbeach new town will accommodate a large amount of planned housing growth and will benefit from improved transport links with Cambridge as part of proposed Greater Cambridge Partnership schemes. In recognition of this planned growth, Waterbeach new town is proposed to be categorised as a Town. The existing settlement of Waterbeach is assessed under the Minor Rural Centres category.

Conclusion regarding towns

3.5 With regard to the reviewed scoring all proposed town tier settlements remain the same scoring as in the 2021 review, with the only change reviewed here being the Cambourne population increasing from 11,290 at 2021 to the current tabulated figure, which also acknowledges the planned growth there.

Cambourne continues to score more favourably than other Rural Centres and is expected to grow significantly, with proposals expected to come forward for further public transport infrastructure which will improve links with Cambridge. In recognition of this planned growth and the increasing level of services and facilities, it is proposed that Cambourne is classified as a Town, with both Northstowe and Waterbeach new town proposed to be Towns once completed.

Rural Centres

Bourn Airfield

3.6 Bourn Airfield is a new village that was first designated in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan 2018, Policy S/6, and once complete is proposed to be categorised as a new Rural Centre in Policy SS/7: Bourn Airfield. In July 2024, planning permission for approximately 3,500 dwellings, employment, retail, hotel and leisure uses, residential institutions, education and community

facilities, and open space was granted. Once developed the village will provide a variety of services and facilities including a small supermarket. The services provided in the settlement will offer significant employment opportunities in the area. The village will be on the Cambourne to Cambridge Busway route meaning there will be efficient high quality segregated public transport and active transport links to larger settlements. Based on its planned provision of services and facilities and transport links Bourn Airfield remains proposed to be classified as a Rural Centre through future plan review.

Cottenham

3.7 The settlement offers a good range of shops and services although none of the food retail offer is enough to meet the 300sqm threshold. The village now scores two points for its job to population ratio. The 8-bus service provides transport to Cambridge, but this service has seen a decrease in its frequency to a 40-minute service. This change in frequency has meant that Cottenham no longer scores any points for this service. Cottenham does not benefit from a segregated public transport route such as the Greater Cambridge Partnership schemes or the Guided Busway. In the Local Plan 2018, Cottenham was regraded from a Minor Rural Centre to a Rural Centre. However, based on its lack of transport infrastructure and decrease in frequency of transport services in the village, it is proposed to now be regraded and classified as a Minor Rural Centre.

Grange Farm

3.8 A new community is proposed to be allocated in Policy S/GF: Land adjacent to the A11 and A1307 at Grange Farm. Once developed it will provide residential development of approximately 6,000 homes, significant employment allocation and a variety of services and facilities to include primary and secondary education, health and community facilities. The settlement will be on the Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) network route meaning there will be efficient high quality segregated public transport and active transport links to larger settlements. Based on its future population, planned provision of services and facilities and transport links this new community will eventually grow into a

large rural centre and potentially a town for the purposes of planning policy, and once developed can be added into the Settlement hierarchy through a future plan review.

Great Shelford and Stapleford

3.9 Great Shelford and Stapleford are two settlements that act as one centre. The settlements provide a sufficient range of shops and services and a village centre that is an important characteristic of a Rural Centre. Neither settlement has a village college, but both have public transport links to Sawston via the 7-bus route which also provides a service to Cambridge. The frequency of this service has decreased to a 30-minute frequency which has been reflected in the scoring. It will also have a stop as part of phase 2 of the Greater Cambridge Transport CSET scheme, meaning that it will have improved transport links to larger settlements, it has now received a point for this GCP scheme. Based on current and future infrastructure provisions that are expected to be delivered in the area, it is proposed that Great Shelford and Stapleford remain classified as a Rural Centre.

Histon and Impington

3.10 Histon and Impington are two settlements which act as one centre. Both settlements offer residents with significant employment opportunities through growth in employment areas such as Vision Park. There is a guided bus stop as well as the 8-bus service which provides frequent public transport to Cambridge and the Science Park. The guided busway also provides a safe cycle access to Cambridge Science Park. The settlements have several key facilities including Impington Village College as well as large variety of shops. Histon and Impington is proposed to remain as a Rural Centre.

Sawston

3.11 This large settlement's population has grown by circa 300 residents since the 2021 study and will continue to grow with over 400 additional dwellings anticipated over the current plan period. The village continues to offer a good

range of services and facilities including a large food store. It has a village college, and it is serviced by the 7-bus service which has seen a decreased in frequency since 2021, now every 30 minutes Monday to Saturday and hourly on a Sunday. The village will additionally have a stop as part of phase 2 of the Greater Cambridge CSET scheme which will provide further transport links into Cambridge. In both the east and southern edges of the village there are several employment locations. It is surrounded by numerous Group and Infill villages for which it provides services and therefore it is proposed that Sawston will remain as a Rural Centre.

Conclusion regarding existing Rural Centres

3.12 The new settlement of Bourn Airfield a Rural Centre, with each settlement to be added into the Settlement hierarchy through future plan review. All existing Rural Centres were reviewed finding although Sawston's bus service has decreased in frequency resulting in reduced scoring, this has not materially impacted its position in the hierarchy as it continues to perform well against the assessment methodology for a Rural Centre. The remaining Rural Centres listed also score well against the methodology and as such all are proposed to remain classified as Rural Centres, except for Cottenham. Cottenham was classified in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan as a Rural Centre. Based on a revision to the criteria for Rural Centres that they must have high quality public transport in the form of a segregated public transport route; it is proposed that Cottenham is regraded from a Rural Centre to a Minor Rural Centre.

Minor Rural Centres

Bar Hill

3.13 The settlement has good public transport links and cycle links (via the A14) to Cambridge. It is on the 5-bus route which directly connects the settlement to Cambridge, which has seen a decrease in service to every 30 mins in frequency. Bar Hill offers a large variety of shops and services including Tesco, one of only 2 large supermarkets in the district. Between the good public transport and range of services this results in a high number of points awarded to Bar Hill for service provision. The settlement has seen an increase in job density adding a point to its score since the last update. There is no Secondary School within the settlement, and its links to Swavesey Village College are not frequent. It is therefore proposed that Bar Hill remain as a Minor Rural Centre in the Settlement Hierarchy.

Bassingbourn

3.14 Bassingbourn offers several key shops and services, including a post office, pharmacy and pub, which serve a small rural hinterland. The settlement also has a secondary school. Although it is one of the lower scoring Minor Rural Centres, it remains an important village for service provision for the surrounding villages in the southwestern part of the district and therefore it is proposed to continue to be categorised as a Minor Rural Centre in the Settlement Hierarchy.

Comberton

3.15 The settlement has a good range of services, including a primary school and a secondary school, which means it offers a greater range of services than a group village. It continues to receive no points for Jobs. Although being on the proposed Greater Cambridge Partnership greenway route, no points are awarded for transport as it is over 8km from Cambridge. Based on the village's

service provision being greater than a Group village, it is proposed to remain as a Minor Rural Centre.

Fulbourn

3.16 In the 2018 Local Plan, Fulbourn was regraded from a Rural Centre to a Minor Rural Centre. The area offers a similar range of services to other Minor Rural Centres. It does not however have its own Village College. The village is served by the 1 bus route which continues to provide a 30-minute frequency of service into Cambridge. The village also scores a point for its ease of active travel into Cambridge, which will be further enhanced through the proposed Greater Cambridge Partnership Greenway scheme. The village continues to have a high ratio of jobs to population. Fulbourn is proposed to remain classified as a Minor Rural Centre.

Gamlingay

3.17 Gamlingay continues to have one of the lowest scores for a Minor Rural Centre. Despite its score, it offers a range of shops and services typical to a Minor Rural Centre. The village continues to score no points for transport or jobs and does not have a secondary school. Despite the village scoring lower than other settlements in the category, it is the only large settlement in the very western part of the district and therefore plays an important role in providing services to its rural hinterland. Therefore, it is proposed that Gamlingay remains classified a Minor Rural Centre.

Girton

3.18 Girton is also a low scoring Minor Rural Centre. The village provides some key facilities but does not have a secondary school. It has seen an increase in the ratio of jobs to population, which has meant that the village now receives a point for job density. Due to its proximity to Cambridge, it means active travel is possible. The village is served by the 6-bus service which provides direct travel to Cambridge; however, the decreased frequency means the village has now

lost a point for this service. Upon review, it is proposed Girton will remain as a Minor Rural Centre.

Linton

3.19 Linton continues to be one of the highest scoring Minor Rural Centres. It has a bus service that connects it to Cambridge and Haverhill. The delivery of the Linton Greenway is underway with sections 1 and 2 now completed and it is expected that work will begin on the remaining sections in Winter 2025. The village has a variety of services including a village college. It offers a good range of shops and services which serve the rural hinterland. The village now scores two points for jobs due to an increase to job to population ratio. Despite Linton scoring highly in the assessment due to serving as a service centre, it is not considered to be comparable with settlements in the Rural Centre grouping of the hierarchy as it has a lower number of services and facilities. Therefore, it is proposed Linton will remain as a Minor Rural Centre.

Melbourn

3.20 Melbourn remains the largest village in the south west of the district. There are no Rural Centres in this part of the district, but it is within 8km of Royston. The village has a secondary school and a range of shops and services that serve the wider rural hinterland, offering a similar range of services to other Minor Rural Centres. There is a Greater Cambridge Partnership Greenway scheme which has been proposed, which if it comes forward would improve pedestrian and cycle links to Cambridge via Foxton and Harston. Based on review, given that it does not score as well for services as those in the Rural Centre grouping, it is proposed that Melbourn will remain as a Minor Rural Centre.

Milton

3.21 Milton continues to be one of the few villages with a large food store, so scores highly on shops and services. The village also receives two points for employment due to having a high job to population ratio. Milton does not have a secondary school and lacks good public transport access to Impington Village College or Cottenham Village College. The village is however served by the Milton Park and Ride, offering a high frequency bus service to Cambridge, with buses coming operating every 10 minutes. Active Travel is also possible from the village due to its proximity to Cambridge and this will be further improved by the Waterbeach to Cambridge Greenway Greater Cambridge Partnership Scheme. The village, based on its current and projected improvements to transport infrastructure, is proposed to remain as a Minor Rural Centre.

Papworth Everard

3.22 Papworth Everard is one of the lowest scoring Minor Rural Centres. The village continues to score no points for its job to population ratio. Papworth Everard doesn't have a secondary school and receives no points for employment or transport. It provides some key services that are accessed by those in the surrounding rural hinterland. The village is served by the 3X bus service to a market town outside of the district. This service has increased in its frequency to 30-minutes and therefore the village now receives one point. While Papworth does not score well using the point system, due to its role of serving the rural hinterland it is proposed to remain as a Minor Rural Centre.

Swavesey

3.23 Swavesey provides some important services to surrounding hinterland, including a village college. The village continues to benefit from a high job to population ratio and scores two points as a result. Swavesey is served by the guided busway and scores one point for its access to this. Despite not having as wider range services as many of the other Minor Rural Centres offer, based on its access to secondary education and employment, it is proposed Swavesey remains categorised as a Minor Rural Centre.

Waterbeach

3.24 Waterbeach has a good variety of service and facilities, despite not having a village college. It has a train station with two services to Cambridge per hour, a slight decrease in frequency from the previous review – this service will be

more distant when the station is moved to Waterbeach new town. The village is now served by the Milton PR5 bus service which provides a bus service into central Cambridge. Transport infrastructure will be further improved in the village through Greater Cambridge Partnership Schemes, including the Waterbeach to Cambridge North Public Transport Scheme and Waterbeach Greenway proposals. Waterbeach continues to have a high ratio of jobs to population. Based on review, it is proposed Waterbeach remains categorised as a Minor Rural Centre.

Wellcome Genome Campus

3.25 Wellcome Genome Campus is a proposed new settlement designation through Policy S/WGC: Wellcome Genome Campus, Hinxton. In December 2020, planning permission for approximately 1,500 dwellings, employment, primary education, retail, hotel and leisure uses, conference facility, community facilities, cycleways and public transport infrastructure was granted. Based on its level of planned provision of services and facilities, the need dependencies for provision of primary education and health provision, the potential transport links to other settlements and wider transport networks, the Wellcome Genome Campus is proposed to be classified within the Settlement hierarchy as a Minor Rural Centre through future plan review.

Willingham

3.26 Willingham continues to offer a range of shops and services typical of other Minor Rural Centres. It is not awarded any points for transport given the distance between the village and the busway. Points have also not been awarded for the other bus services in the village due to their low frequency. It does not have a secondary school or score any points for job density. Willingham continues to play a role as a centre for nearby villages and therefore it is proposed to remain as a Minor Rural Centre.

Conclusion regarding Minor Rural Centres

3.27 Wellcome Genome Campus is proposed to be a Minor Rural Centre, added into the Settlement hierarchy, once built, through future plan review. All existing Minor Rural Centres were reviewed and some changes in scoring were captured regarding transport and employment, however, due to there being no significant changes to these villages no changes to grades for existing villages in this category are proposed.

Group Villages

3.28 All group villages were assessed using the points system. The villages which have good existing or proposed sustainable transport links to Cambridge or other large settlements outside of the district have been picked out below and assessed in further detail to understand if their position on the hierarchy should be changed.

Group Villages with good sustainable transport links

3.29 The most sustainably located Group villages have been considered in further detail below. These villages are either on an existing or proposed public transport route or in close enough proximity to allow active transport to Cambridge or a market town outside the district. Due to these sustainable transport links, these settlements performed well using the scoring system.

Foxton

3.30 Foxton has a train station, that allows direct access to central Cambridge. If comes forward, access to the train station will be enhanced by the proposed Greater Cambridge Partnership travel hub, which would provide approximately 750 car parking space and around 50 high quality cycle parking spaces near the train station. The village does fall on the Melbourn Greenway Route, but as it over 8km from Cambridge it is not awarded any additional points for cycle access. Although the village of Foxton is well connected to surrounding centres,

it still lacks the level of shops or services in comparison to the higher village categories. The village has also seen a decrease in employment since the 2021 update meaning it loses its point. Based on the updated evidence, it is proposed that Foxton continue to be categorised as a Group Village.

Great Abington

3.31 The village continues to score two points as its job to population ratio remains high as a result of Granta Park and has an increase in the overall population. The area is well connected and will have greater sustainable transport links through the Greater Cambridge Partnership Linton Greenway and Cambridge South East Transport Scheme (CSET) which would result in improved sustainable transport links between Great Abington and Cambridge. The village is served by the 13 bus service, which continues to provide a 30-minute frequency service to Cambridge and to Linton which has a secondary school. Upon review, Great Abington does not serve as a centre, has a lower level of services in comparison to the higher village categories, and therefore it is proposed that it will remain as a Group Village.

Hardwick

3.32 Hardwick does not have a secondary school but does score highly in comparison to other villages for this category due to the shops and services it provides. However, the range of services it provides does not warrant it moving up the hierarchy. It continues to have good public transport links with the village being served by the 4-bus route, which provides 20-minute frequency service to Cambridge. The village is also on the planned Greater Cambridge Partnership route between Cambourne and Cambridge and is awarded an additional point for transport to reflect this. Based on the updated evidence, it is proposed Hardwick will remain as a Group Village. It is in close proximity to the proposed new settlement at Bourn Airfield which will perform as a centre for the surrounding rural hinterland.

Highfields Caldecote

3.33 Highfields Caldecote offer a reasonable range of shops and services for its category but does not have a secondary school. It is well connected to Cambridge as it will be on the Cambourne to Cambridge bus route and have cycle way access which would result in improved sustainable transport links between Highfield Caldecote and Cambridge, and given it is within 8km of Cambridge providing a safe off-road cycle link it receives a point for active travel. It is proposed to continue to be categorised as a Group Village.

Longstanton

3.34 The village offers a variety of services including a small food store and therefore scores highly in comparison to other villages in this category. The guided busway station is 20 minute walk from the village centre, meaning that it is inconvenient for access for public transport and therefore is not awarded an additional point for access to the busway. It is however, awarded a point through its access to the 5-bus service which goes through the village high street to Cambridge every 30-minutes. Although there is an increase in score it does not materially affect the category as the village still does not perform as a centre and therefore it is proposed to continue to be categorised as a Group Village.

Meldreth

3.35 Meldreth is one of the only villages in this category that has a train station. The station provides train services to both Cambridge and London and scores an additional point for this. It is in close proximity to the larger village of Melbourn which provides services and facilities for the rural hinterland in the south west of the district. As a result, no change is proposed to Meldreth's place in the settlement hierarchy, and it is proposed that it will remain as a Group Village.

Oakington

3.36 Oakington does not offer a good range of shops and services and does not have a secondary school. It is well connected to Cambridge by the busway/ St

lves Greenway and is therefore awarded an additional point for busway although at the edge of the village. It receives a point for Greenway access given it is within 8km of Cambridge so it can provide a safe off-road cycle link. Although on the 6-bus route, this service has reduced in frequency to a 40-minute service meaning Oakington loses one transport point. Although well connected, Oakington does not offer the range of services to be considered a centre and has therefore proposed to continue to be categorised as a Group Village.

Over

3.37 Over provides a number of key services including a pharmacy and village hall which means it scores highly in this category. The village does not score any points for jobs and does not score any points for transport or for active travel as it is 1.5km away from the busway and cycleway. Over is served by the number 5 bus service to Cambridge, however the frequency of this service does not score the village any points. The village also does not have a secondary school. Based on updated evidence it is proposed that Over will remain categorised as a Group Village.

Teversham

3.38 The village continues to not be well served by public transport, with the nearest stop for the 1-bus route being a 15-minute walk from the village. Teversham does not have a secondary school or a GP surgery. It does not offer the same level of services that would be seen in Milton, Girton and Fulbourn, all of which are comparably close to Cambridge. As a result, it is proposed to continue to be categorised as a Group Village.

Whittlesford

3.39 The settlement comprises of Whittlesford and Whittlesford Bridge. It scores a point due to the presence of Whittlesford Parkway Train Station, despite the station being a 15 minute walk from the village of Whittlesford. Whittlesford continues to score one point for jobs. In comparison to Minor Rural Centres,

Whittlesford does not offer the same level of service provision. Although well connected, Whittlesford continues to not offer a level of services to warrant it being regraded on the hierarchy and therefore proposed to remain as a Group Village.

Conclusion regarding Group Villages

- 3.40 The villages above were selected for the previous study in 2021 for their sustainable transport links, and in review all continue to score well using the points system. No additional villages in this category were selected for consideration as to whether they should be regraded, as there were no significant changes to the scoring and as such it is proposed they should remain as Group Villages.
- 3.41 While some of the scores for Group Villages have changed through the study update, it is considered that these changes are not significant enough to warrant a change in the settlement hierarchy, as these settlements still do not provide the levels of services that would be required to function as a centre. All are proposed to remain as Group Villages.

Infill villages with a Primary School or GP surgery

- 3.42 Upon reviewing all villages in the Hierarchy, the Councils had identified both Little Eversden and Babraham as Infill villages that had service provisions that were found in villages that are categorised higher in the Settlement Hierarchy. Therefore, the councils reviewed whether as a result they should be re classified in the hierarchy.
- 3.43 Little Eversden is classified as Infill Villages despite having a GP surgery. The village has a very small population of less than 600 people. It does not have good sustainable transport links or range of shops and services and therefore despite it having a key facility typical of a village higher in the hierarchy, it is proposed to remain as an Infill village.

3.44 Babraham is also currently classified as an Infill village. The village is served by a primary school, although does not offer many services. Babraham is awarded two points for its job to population ratio, given the presence of Babraham Research Campus. In terms of transport provision, the village receives points for the 13A bus service that continues to operate at a 30-minute frequency, the village also receives a point for its stop on the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) scheme. In review, it is proposed that Babraham is regraded from an Infill Village to a Group Village.

Conclusion regarding Infill villages

3.45 It is proposed that Babraham is regraded from an Infill Village to a Group Village. Remaining Infill villages were reviewed and some changes in scoring were captured regarding transport and employment, however, due to there being no significant changes to the level of services these villages provide, no further regrades for villages in this category are proposed.

4. Summary and Conclusions

- 3.46 The Settlement Hierarchy Review in 2025 firstly considered whether the existing categorisations of settlements remains appropriate. The existing categorisation of settlements in Greater Cambridge remains relevant and reflects the pattern of development and sustainability of different settlements in the district. The previous category of New settlements is proposed to be replaced by the category of Towns.
- 3.47 The New settlements of Northstowe and Waterbeach (new town) are proposed to be placed within the Town category. In recognition of the level of services it provides, planned future growth and improvements to public transport, Cambourne is proposed to be regraded from a Rural Centre to a Town.
- 3.48 The New Settlement of Bourn Airfield is proposed to be placed within the Rural Centre category once complete. As Cottenham still does not have a segregated public transport route, it is proposed to be moved from a Rural Centre to a Minor Rural Centre.

- 3.49 All the current Minor Rural Centres are proposed to remain as such. All the existing Group Villages are proposed to remain as such. Based on the village connections to Cambridge through its improved transport infrastructure and continuing to offer a level of facilities that are attributed to Rural Centres, Babraham is proposed to be regraded from an Infill Village to a Group Village. There are no further changes proposed to the Infill Village tier.
- 3.50 The findings of the study, along with other evidence bases, will inform the development strategy for the district in the Greater Cambridge Local Plan, and be subject to consultation through the plan making process.
- 3.51 Details of the revised hierarchy of settlements are shown in full below:

Figure 1: Current settlement hierarchy in Greater Cambridge





Figure 2: Proposed settlement hierarchy in Greater Cambridge






Figure 2: Greater Cambridge Partnership Greenways Network Map (Image credit Greater Cambridge Partnership). First published in the 2021 study.






Figure 3: Greater Cambridge Partnership Barton Greenway (Image credit Greater Cambridge Partnership). First published in the 2025 Study







. Figure 4: Greater Cambridge Partnership Haslingfield Greenway (Image credit Greater Cambridge Partnership). First published in the 2025 study.









Figure 12: Greater Cambridge Partnership Cambridge South East Transport Route (CSET) – phase 1 (Image credit Greater Cambridge Partnership). Figure as published in the 2021 study.





Figure 13: Greater Cambridge Partnership Cambridge South East Transport Route (CSET) – phase 2 (Image credit Greater Cambridge Partnership). Figure as published in the 2021 study


